SOULE KINDRED REUNION NEWS

Dear cousins:

Plans are progressing nicely for our 1976 Bicentennial reunion in Philadelphia and a tentative schedule is given below. I want to point out that we have planned a full day of touring Friday 11 June. To beat the tourist rush-crush we plan a 9 AM arrival at Independence Hall. I would strongly encourage each of you to plan a Thursday night in the Philadelphia area. Some have planned to arrive Friday morning...and of course we welcome you anytime but I hate to see any of you miss any of the tours. It will be possible to join the tour anytime and we will program "skips" so those who want to rest at Independence Park can skip some of the sights. I hope, all of you can join us for the informal coffee hour Thursday evening.

ALL our tours are FREE....but our buses will not be free and the charge will range between \$5 & \$6.00 each for Friday and about the same for Saturday.

For those staying over Monday evening, 14 June, I can send you free tickets for the Philadelphia Orchestra concert in Robin Hood Dell in the park (which is near Wynnestay). I need a self-addressed envelope, stamped, however from those desiring such tickets.

Meunion - cont. Inc dorms at St. Joseph College will close to our group Monday, 14 June, and there was NOT enough interest to open them before Thursday, 10 June. There are OTHER ecconomy accommodations however available here. The old Methodist hotel, the Robert Morris, was bought by Philadelphia College of Bible several years ago. It is across the street from the Arch St. Presby-terian Church and PCB will operate it this summer again as a hotel. They were using it for a dorm. Naturally they have NO bar! A pamphlet on the Robert Morris is enclosed for those who need added accomodation.

I ask each of you staying at the college to send in your total rent due one month in advance so I can have all that straightened out. Rooms at the college have two single beds. It is not clear at this time if the college will have their cafeteria open on our weekend. There are however within one block four restaurants, one beef and ale house, a pizza parlor and Gino's hamburger stand not to mention one Dairy Queen. What more could any American want!

Prominent SOULE' Family of New Orleans

By Colonel John Soule - Family Historian

This subject is virtually limitless as far as our information is concerned. The pages of prior issues of SOULE NEWSLETTER are replete with stories on the Soule/Soule' (latter accented usage is "de rigueur" in New Orleans) families and their not too distant cousins of California – and elsewhere. Births have been recorded in the famed "Crescent City" since 1819. We have abstracted data on over a hundred of those bearing our surname (with a few variants) through 30 Jun 1937. The earliest found: Nelvil Alfred Soule, son of prominent French born Pierre Soule' [see N/L 1:21 Apr 1967 and 4:180 Oct 1970] and his wife Henrietta Armantine (Mercier) Soule'. New Orleans marriage records begin in 1831 and we have copied data on 68 cousins between that date and 30 Jun 1937. Death records date from 1805. We have on file 86 names of these decedents to our 1937 cut-off date. We have also abstracted Soule data appearing in the 1850-1860-1870 and 1880 Census Returns plus photocopies (unfortunately now too badly faded to have much useful value) of many early city directories.

Our enthusiastic co-founder of SOULE KINDRED and early NEWSLETTER editor GEORGE STANDISH SOULE attended the 1976 Mardi Gras festivities, lunched with a one-time Soule Queen of Mardi Gras, and sent us a page from the current New Orleans Telephone Directory enumerating no less than 37 Soule numbers. Many of these are recognized by us as "prominent" families; hence, we have to define the branch we're writing about. Certainly, demand for progress on the forthcoming Soule volume of "MAY-FLOWER FAMILIES Through Five Generations" limits our capacity to expand and present a more complete genealogy and history of the several groups of family members in New Orleans we do know about. Consequently, we can only cover at this time the family of Colonel George Soule or Dr. George Soule, LLD, also known as Professor George Soule, born Barrington, Yates County, NY 14 Mar 1834 and died New Orleans, LA 26 Jan 1926. He was the second son of Ebenezer & Cornelia Elizabeth (Hogeboom) Soule. He was married at Summit, Pike County, MS to Mary Jane Reynolds 6 Sep 1860. She was born Summit 1 Jan 1841, the daughter of Jonathan Reynolds, and died New Orleans 22 Jan 1918 ae 77.

Editor Mary Crismore has recently received on loan an 1890 photograph of a Soule family of New Orleans summering in Petoskey, Michigan. Fortunately, the contributor of that photograph has also given the names of those appearing in that picture. Editor Crismore has urged your Historian to tell you all that we know about this family and explain, if practicable, why they were in northern Michigan. They were certainly the descendants of the above George Soule (1834-1926) and friends. As to why they were at a Lake Michigan resort town, one has only to have been in New Orleans during the summer before the days of universal air conditioning. High ceilings and those large, liesurely sweeping ceiling fans did help. None-the-less a couple of long L&N summer commuter trains evacuated thousands from the steaming city on week-day afternoons towards fine summer homes along the Mississippi Gulf Coast and returned them the following work-day morning. Needless to say, those who could afford the luxury of cool and enticing Michigan lake-front, certainly took advantage of such vacations. We can imagine that equally distant Wisconsin or even much farther away Maine also attracted other refugees from the heat and humidity of home!

Col. John Soule took time out from his busy schedule to get the story about this Soule family of New Orleans. He thinks more could be learned about this family picture and people if time were available. The family no doubt goes back to the George Soule who employed Mr. Ridlon to prove his line and that is how he ended up writing the SOULE GENEALOGY. Col. John has been unable at this time to prove one generation, he says, but has uncovered many items of interest that unproves some items in the book.

Does anyone have a clue to some of the uncovered documents needed to prove that line?

Mrs. Brown, that sent in the picture, is the daughter of a Levin Cooper Gosney. Levin Cooper Gosney was named for Capt. Levin Cooper.

Levin Cooper Gosney was the sixth child of William James Gosney and wife, Josephine. There might be some relationship between the Gosney and Cooper family since one child bore the name of Capt. Cooper.

If there is a relationship between the Soule family and the Gosney family before the marriage of Anna S. Cooper to Albert Lee Soule, it is not known. Mrs. Brown is much interested in this Soule family and has become a supporting member of our Soule Kindred for this year. We thank her for her contribution and hope we may learn more of these two families.

Their son (11th Generation from Pilgrim George Soule of The Mayflower) is JOHN FAYETTE SOULE, born Pensacola on 6 May 1953, the Bridegroom. [KINDRED No. 533414X556]

I spend most of my time in Brooklyn, writing a column for the Brooklyn section of The News. Contrary to the negative propoganda spread by some ex-Brocklynites who justify their move to the suburbs by bad-mouthing their old home town, Brooklyn is a great place, full of life and energy. The Dodgers may be long gone, but Brooklyn still leads the league in vitality.

From one end of the borough to the other, from the handsome new Restoration Shopping Center in Bedford-Stuyvesant to the mammoth Kings Plaza retail complex at the tip of Flatbush Ave., you see busy, hard-working people making a buck and spending it.

Brooklyn is loaded with diversity. For example, Brooklyn Heights and Bay Ridge are thoroughly

Bay Ridge are thoroughly dissimilar neighborhoods, except that both have dozens of charming streets with lovely, sturdy houses. History? My pal Frank Grasso of Flatbush insists that the Revolutionary War was won in Brooklyn. The turning point he says hannened ary War was won in Brooklyn. The turning point, he says, happened when 400 troops who had come up from Maryland held off the British long enough for George Washington to lead his men in retreat to Staten Island and New Jersey, allowing them to regroup and to fight another day.

to improve their neighborhoods. They don't look down their noses at poor people. Most everybody in Brooklyn was poor at one time. Brooklyn people take pride that their borough has always welcomed Immigrants—Irish, Jewish, Italian, black, Hispanic, Scandinavian, etc.—and that, despite some racial tensions that seem to be rooted in economic deprivation, Brooklynites of different colors and back-

in economic deprivation, Brooklynites of different colors and backgrounds get along extremely well on the whole.

I can't prove it, but I'll bet there's more peaceful integration in Brooklyn than anywhere else in America. Just to give you one small example, I hang out in The Windmill on Fourth Ave. and 35th St., above Bush Terminal. Go in there any night after work and you'll see blacks, Puerto Ricans, Poles, Italians and Irishmen drinking together at the bar. "The Windmill is the League of Nations," Benny the bartender likes to say.

Thanks to my exposure to Brooklyn, I know better when I read editorials and hear commentators saying that New York is "a hulking giant of a city rushing toward oblivion" or is "on the brink of catastrophe" or "in the throes of disintegration." Aside from their lousy metaphors, the doom merchants who push this line simply don't know what is going on under their noses in this city.

They sit in Manhattan office towers and read each other's broadcasts and crack jokes about President Ford and complain about Mayor Beame.

After work, they meet each other for drinks at Costello's. Then they ride home together on the train to Westport. Ask any of them

where Boerum Hill is and he will give you a blank stare and venture a guess that it is a new town in Rockland County. Boerum is what makes New York a great city. It is a tiny neighborhood tucked under Brooklyn Heights and Cobble Hill just neighborhood tucked under Brooklyn Heights and Cobble Hill just south of downtown Brooklyn. It is a stone's throw — if you have an arm like Carl Furillo — from the Gowanus Canal. A dozen years ago, Boerum Hill was a slum, one of the worst in the city. The stately, graceful, 100-year-old homes along State and Pacific and Dean and Bergen and Wyckoff Sts. had been converted into rooming houses. All the tenants were poor. Willie Sutton, the great bank robber, used to hole up in Boerum Hill when he was ducking the law. It was the place to go if you were seeking anonymity.

And then, suddenly, young middle-income people fed up with high rents in Manhattan began buying up Boerum Hill houses, getting them at bargain prices and restoring them themselves. They made a hobby out of what they called "brownstoning." House after house, block after block, Boerum Hill resurrected itself. The process continues.

process continues.

The other day I stopped in for a visit with a lovely actress, Dale Soules, who recently bought a four-story, 13-room brick row house on Wyckoff St., opposite the Gowanus Houses. She and a friend, costume designer Kathl Horne, a Miami native, took the place because they wanted lots of space. The renovation may take them forever, but they don't care. They enjoy the work. "I like the idea of creating the environment that surrounds me," Dale says. Dale will soon be seen once again as Doug Henning's assistant and co-star in "The Magic Show" on Broadway. She played the role before but quit it briefly for a part in an off-Broadway show. She goes back to "The Magic Show" on Jan. 7. She'll grab the F train every night at Bergen and Smith Sts., and it will deliver her practically to the door of the Cort Theatre. Dale isn't afraid to ride the trains after dark. The other day I stopped in for a visit with a lovely actress,

Dale is a typical Boerum Hill renovator, — bright, independent, adventurous. She was raised by her grandmother in a small town in northern New Jersey.

"I love my house," she told me. "I love the big rooms, the high


ceilings, the rose bushes that bloom in the garden out back in the summer. Does it bother me that there is a housing project across summer. Does it bother me that there is a housing project across the street? No. I grew up poor myself. I ate a lot of Spam as a kid. The people around here care for each other. If somebody sees somebody breaking into a house, the police will get a call right away. Everyone is very conscious of maintaining a good neighborhood."

It is worth bearing in mind, the next time you are assured that New York is dying, that Dale Soules and thousands of people like her keep turning up, year after year in Rocking Hill and Fort.

Brenda Soule, star of the Apponequet Girls basketball team, credits her brother with her development as a basketball player.

Brenda led her feam to the Division II South championship before the Lakers were eliminated in the semifinals two weeks ago. Brenda had a 22 point average throughout the year.

Before meeting Brenda, it is difficult to picture what a 4' 11" basketball player, who scored 1083 career points, will look like. The best word to describe Brenda is compact. Standing in gym shorts, an adidas T-shirt, and a pair of converse all-stars, she is definitely not muscular, nor is she fragile. Her brown hair is short but not unfeminine. Her green eyes emit confidence.

In an interview recently before her softball practice (Brenda is a shortstop), Brenda appeared reserved and thoughtful.

She paused at each question, not rushing an answer but instead pondering, as if this interview were a test of some type.

Brenda, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Herbert Soule of Chipaway Road, East Freetown, spent a lot of her time on the basketball court with her brother Jeff, he is four years older than Brenda.

Brenda said she probably started playing basketball when she was seven or eight or maybe even younger. Since Brenda was the only girl in the neighborhood, she often accompanied her brother to the basketball court, she said.

He wouldn't push me to play but would just ask me if I wanted to go play basketball with him. "I don't know what made him want to stick with me. Now I ask him if he wants



GEORGE SOULE

From the desk of -COLONEL JOHN SOULE

In 580 A. D. and again in 587 A. D., the Vascones came over the rugged Pyrenees bringing the Basque language and culture into what is now southern France. The four Basque provinces in Spain have maintained their identity and governmental autonomy. One of the three smaller provinces to the north was called Zhiberoa by the Basques but the "Land of Soule" by the French. A secluded mountain valley averaging about eight or ten miles wide and not much over thirty miles long, it seems probable that the old French 'sol' or 'sole', meaning a lonely place, contributed to the present name. We suspect, but cannot prove, that the family surname really started in that picturesque valley. Local tradition says that early migrants adopted the Soule' name. The Huguenot Society still accepts the descendants of George Soule as members on the unproven and somewhat dubious theory that he was actually a refugee from the religious unrest in France before joining the Mayflower company. Certainly, the name is far from uncommon in France to-day, and, some eight or ten French immigrants are known to have brought it to this country.

On the other side of the coin, Percy Hide Reaney in his <u>Dictionary of British Surnames</u> (1958) identifies under SOLE, SOLES, SOAL, and SOALL, a number of 13th Century residents as bearing the names of old French origin. Concurrently, about the same number are attributed to the old English "sol" meaning "mud, wallowing place for animals, pool". In fact, there was an early town in Kent named Soles. In Reaney's later book <u>The Origin of English Surnames</u> (1967) he writes "No full account can yet be given of the place of origin beyond the sea of the countless men who appear in medieval England with surnames undoubtedly foreign."

Reaney also says "Sole, from atte Sole 'dweller by the pool' is common in Kent and found also in Surry and Sussex". Consequently, our mild conviction that the name is of French origin must be tempered by the realization that the old English toponym must be recognized as a distinct possibility. Certainly, on-going research indicates that Soule was not uncommon throughout the southeastern part of England during the 16th and 17th centuries with George a very common given name of that era. We regret that no record identifiable with the Pilgrim has been found; also, that previous theories by Banks and others have been disproven.

The Mayflower status of Pilgrim George Soule is clearly established as a "servant" to relatively wealthy Pilgrim Edward Winslow; also, as a signer of the famed Mayflower Compact of 11 Nov 1620, O.S. It appears logical therefore, to assume that Winslow bore the cost of passage to Plymouth aboard Mayflower; also, that our subject had reached the age of 21 by 1620. Incidentally, nothing has been found to suggest that George ever returned to England. He was thrifty and became one of the wealthiest and highly respected members of the Colony. In July 1627 he was one of a group of fifty-eight "Purchasers or Old Comers" who assumed the Colony's debt to "The Adventurers", the promotors and capitalists who financed the Mayflower voyage and other early ventures and expenses. In return, the group was granted trading concessions in Maine, at Cape Ann, Buzzards Bay and the Connecticut River. General Court, the governing body of the colony, voted 5 Mar 1639/40 to pay these "Purchasers or Old Comers" for the surrender of their patent. Existing land records show that he acquired extensive holdings in Duxbury, Dartmouth, Middleboro, Marshfield and Bridgewater but resided only in Plymouth and Duxbury or "Ducksborrow" as it was called

originally. The date of removal from Plymouth to Duxbury can only be approximated. Although settled early, Duxbury did not become a separate town until 7 Jun 1637. George Soule may have been residing there 5 May 1640 when he was appointed to view and measure meadows at Greenes Harbor (Marshfield) or when acquiring his own "meddow" at Greenes Harbor on 2 Nov 1640; certainly, by the time he appeared before the General Court on 27 Sep 1642 as one of two "Deputies" or representatives from Duxbury. Plymouth Colony established representative government in 1939 after finding it no longer practicable to have all of the colonists participate as individuals. These representatives were limited to terms of one year and denied the right of succession so we find Pilgrim Soule serving each alternate year for many years, with interesting assignments such as forming a committee 26 Oct 1646 with Anthony Thatcher "to draw up an order concerning disorderly drinking of tobacco"; appointed 5 Jun 1650 to a committee on "making and repealing of laws" and finally 7 Mar 1653/4 to act regarding confederation with Massachusetts Bay Colony.

Early in 1637 the Pequot (sometimes Pequin or Pequod) Indians "fell openly upon the English at Connecticut". In response to a plea for assistance, the Plymouth General Court agreed forthwith to send fifty men. George Soule volunteered for this service 7 Jun 1637 as one of 42 men under Lieutenant William Holmes and Reverend Thomas Prence as chaplain "but when they were ready to march - - - they had word to stay; for the enemy was as good as vanquished and there would be no need." The Society of Colonial Wars recognizes the eligibility for membership of any descendant of George Soule by reason of this "service" which, strictly speaking, was not actually performed. An eye witness also has identified one "George Soule, Sr." as having occupied the fort

at Middleboro for six weeks in 1675 during King Philip's War. Admitting that Pilgrim George Soule was an original proprietor of Middleboro, the disposal of his property there in 1668 and his advancing age, lend credibility to a theory that the member of the fort party was actually the Pilgrim's son George Soule (1639-1704).


