The Executive Board meeting of Soule Kindred in America, Inc. was called to order by President, Mrs. Betty Harris.

George S. Soule reported that our Historian, Col. John Soule, is coming along fine and asked Dr. Glenn Whitecotton to report further about his condition. Dr. Glenn reported that Col. John still complains of tiring easily, says he has gained some weight but otherwise is doing very well. The Board expressed their happiness to hear of his continued progress. George reported that Col. John has the Soule Five Generation book which he is doing for the Mayflower Society almost ready for the publisher, he expects to have it completed by the first of the year. This will be the third book of Mayflower families to come out. It is a complete volume within itself. George has received 70 reservations for books to date, and asked to have the people attending the Reunion who have not placed their reservations for them to please, do so.

Pres. Betty read a letter of regrets from Secretary, Avis Haner, who was unable to attend the Reunion due to the heart catheterization scheduled this week for her daughter, our Treasurer, Betty-Jean Hanner. She stated that this is the first Reunion Betty-Jean has missed since it was organized in 1969. They are looking forward to the Reunion in Plymouth, Mass. next year.

Secretary, Avis Hanner, reported that she had sent 183 letters from June 1976 to September 1977, mostly to people who wanted to know about Soule Kindred in America and to those who had asked genealogical questions which she could find for them in her back issues of the Newsletter she had the information xeroxed and mailed it back to them. Otherwise, they would have had to contact Col. John.

Pres. Betty, reported she had received letters from Robert M. Bartlett and Isabelle Freeman concerning Mr. Bartlett's desire to have the Soule Kindred mailing list to advertise his new book "The Faith of the Pilgrims". After some discussion, George S. Soule made a motion that in lieu of allowing Mr. Bartlett to have the Soule Kindred mailing list that in this case, since it is Pilgrim related material, if he would furnish 400-1 page- brochures and mail them to Fred Soules, Box 1788, Waco, Texas that they could be included in the envelope with the Newsletter. The motion was seconded by Fred Soules and carried.

Board member, Ben George Soule, reported that since Soule Kindred in America, Inc. is a Non-Profit, Educational, Charitable Organization, board members attending the Reunion may deduct the expense for attending from their income tax upon the advice of their accountant. The

IRS number was secured in Texas, but is accepted anywhere in the U.S.A. The number is 23 7253936.

Fred Soules reported that the Reunion is to be held in Plymouth, Mass. the first weekend after Labor Day every third year to allow people to attend the Mayflower Congress while they are in the area. The next Reunion will be held in the Plymouth area on September 8, 9, and 10th 1978. The Mayflower congress will be held September 11, 12, and 13th.

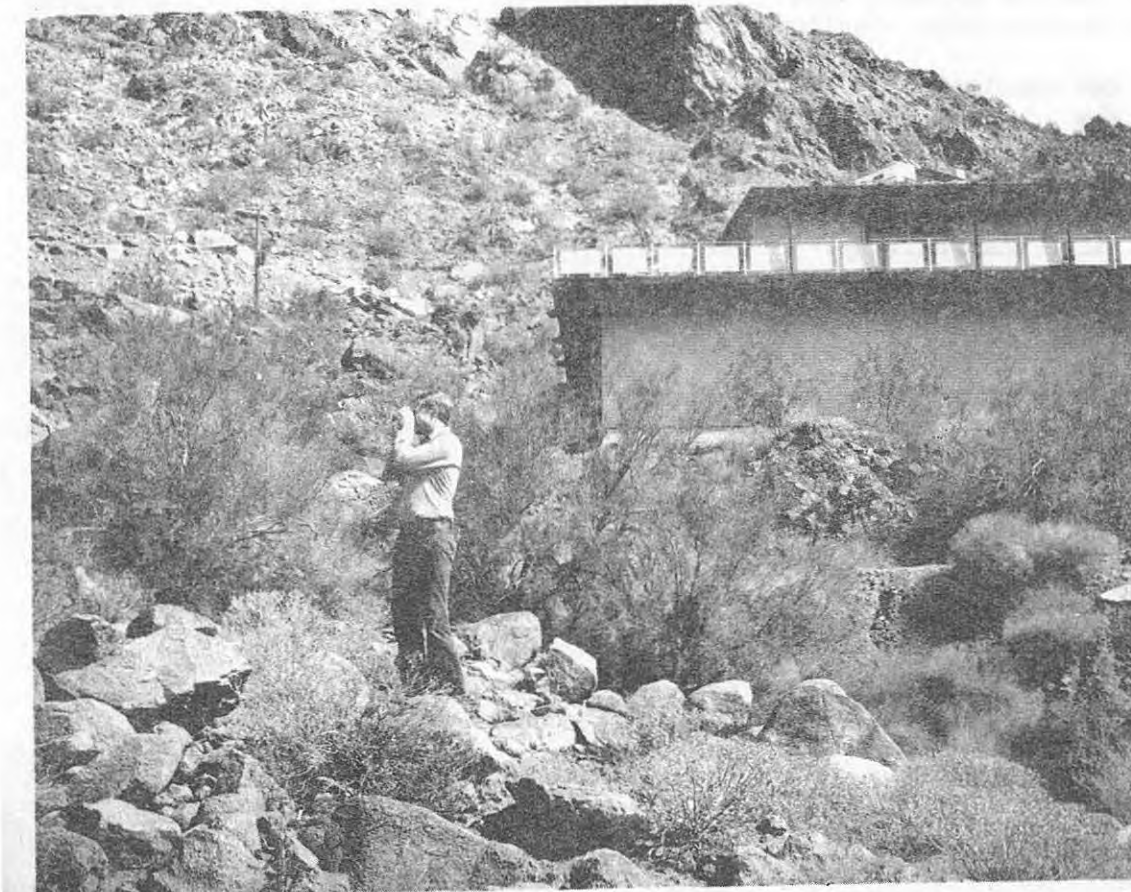

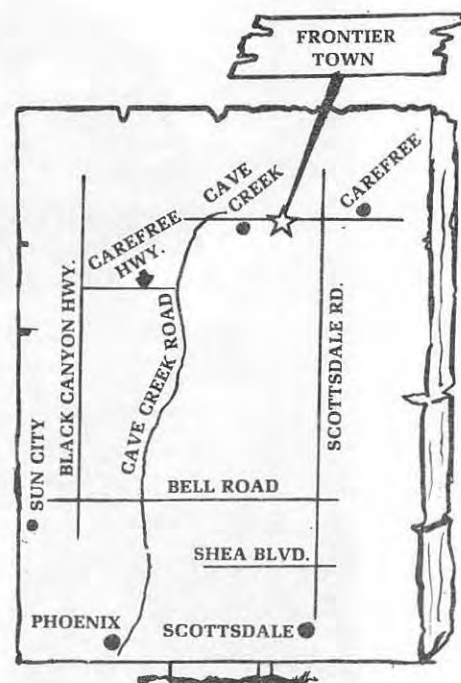

(William (or as I believe Bildad) lived near Eleanor Brigham, his sister in Schoharie Co. Then he must have moved to Onondaga Co. near his brother Charles Williams for Chas. lived at a place in Cortland Co. called Scott which is 3 Mi. from the Onondaga Co. line.

Alma Green who is a cousin to Harriet Davis and living in K. C. and my mother's sister Kate Anes also living there have given me this record altho' from hearing my mother tell of the family I was rather familiar with some of it.

You can find Mildad's record in Directory of Mass. Sailors and Soldiers of the Revolution. His brother Chas. Wms. and a small brother 9 yrs. old named Moses also was in. Moses but 4 days. The record of Capt. Moses is in it also. I wrote to New Marlboro endeavoring to find a record of Bildad's marriage to Jemima. They had his birth record only. It was at New Marlboro they enlisted. It must have been embarrassing to Bildad to go under such an outlandish name, hence he changed it when he left N. Y. in 1816 to come to Vincennes and later Terra Haute.

Alma Green tells me all of Wm. (Bildad's) children were born in N. Y. and Wm. married Almira Baker there.

## QUERIES:

Dear Mrs. Crismore;

In response to your kind offer to print some of my records in the next issue of the Newsletter I'm giving you the following;

Rochester, Ma. Vital Records, Bk. 1, p. 53, records the marriage of Susana Sole and Peter Oliver 3 Feb. 1704. Her death record 24 Dec. 1733 names her Susana Lisbee Oliver but Deed 50:192 recorded in Plymouth states "Susana Oliver late relict, widow of Peter Oliver late of Rochester, Administrator of his estate, now Susana Lasbie of Rochester 28th day of said month 1719---" deeding 30 A. real estate to John West of Dartmouth and signed by Susana Lasbe and Joseph Lasbe 28 Apr. 1719. In 1732 Joseph Lasbe deeds (31:157) lands in Rochester to Joseph Oliver, son of Susana, for 300 Pounds.

There is some evidence that Susana was a daughter of John Soule<sup>2</sup>. Her only child was named Joseph in honor of John's son Joseph, Joshua, another son, named a son Oliver and Benjamin Peterson of Duxbury, son of John's sister, Mary, co-signed her Administrator Bond. Why go so far as Duxbury to get a co-signer if she was daughter of other brothers of John who were but a few miles away in Middleboro or Dartmouth? Colonel John Soule mentions that Ridlon (p.974) lists Hannah as one of John's daughters.

John's 2nd. wife, Esther (Nash) Sampson, was born in 1638. She would be 42 when Joseph and Josiah were born and 44 when Joshua was born in 1682. As they were married in 1679, it is somewhat doubtful that Susana could be her daughter. Susana; married in 1704, only one child in 1706, re-married in 1719 and dead in 1733; could very likely have been born in the early 1670's.

Records of the 1st. Congregational Church of Rochester state that the wife of 5th. generation John Oliver, Huldah, was a member of a church in Stoughton. Canton, Ma. records of births, marriages and deaths in the Town of Stoughton, 1727-1780 by Frederic Endicott, records marriage int of John Oliver and Huldah Rhoads 19 Apr. 1760 and the marriage 29 Jan. 1761 by Rev. Philip Curtis. She was a daughter of John Rhodes and Huldah Howard.

Only by chance could our Soule Historian come upon those Rochester records and even then there would be reluctance to accept unless deeds referred to above were at hand. It would seem more likely that some member of the Oliver family would trace his line back to Peter and Susana. Is it possible to learn who was doing the research? The writer would appreciate any information bearing on the above from readers of the Soule Newsletter.

## HYDE GENEALOGY.

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Herpin and Mary Read, and granddaughter of John Herpin, M. D., who was born about 1690, at Rochefort, France, came to America and settled at Milford in 1710, and m. in 1718, Mary Camp. Capt. John Fowler, d. 17 Aug., 1787, and had two sons born at Milford. Anthony William Herpin Fowler, b. 29 Oct., 1775, was the second son. His wife, Sarah Pond, b. 2 June, 1774, was a daughter of Charles Pond. They settled at Milford, and had seven children].

John William Fowler, was a merchant, and they settled at New York. In 1851 they removed to Milford, where they were living in 1858. They had six children, all except the last, born at New York:

1. *Franklin Hamilton*, b. 19 Feb., 1841, an under graduate at Trinity college, in 1858.
2. *John William*, b. 13 March, 1843, d. 4 Jan., 1844.

VI. JEDEDIAH HYDE (1310), born at Norwich, Conn., 5 Nov., 1761, eldest son of Capt. Jedediah Hyde (307) of Norwich, and afterwards of Hyde Park, Vt., by his first wife Mary Waterman (281), was a great grandson of William Hyde (6) of the third generation. He m. 10 Nov., 1783, Elizabeth Friot, b. 29 Dec., 1765, at Albany, daughter of Abraham Friot. He was a farmer, and they settled at Pawlet, Vt., and, about 1787, removed to South Hero on Grand Isle, Vt., and afterwards removed to Middle Hero (now Grand Isle). He was a man of great energy and influence and filled many public offices, and was frequently a member of the Vermont legislature; and was several times a member of the board of constitutional censors. He d. 24 Nov., 1824, at Burlington, on his way home from a session of the legislature. She d. 27 March, 1842.

They settled at Grand Isle, where he was a wealthy farmer, and where they were living in 1856. They had two children: Margaret A., b. 3 Dec., 1842; and Alfred, b. 23 Feb., 1848.

5. *Ezra Dean*, b. 16 Aug., 1815, m. 11 Sept., 1839, *Parthenia B. Berry*, b. 11 June, 1821, at Alburgh, daughter of Dr. Jirah S. Berry and Parthenia Butler. They settled at Alburgh, and were living at Grand Isle in 1856. They had three children, the two first born at Alburgh: Emma, b. 1 Feb., 1841; Amelia Ann, b. 17 July, 1844, d. 16 Dec., 1854; and Frances A., b. 20 Sept., 1846, at Grand Isle.

He settled at Burlington, Vt., where he was a colonel of militia; and was for many years collector of the customs of the United States for the port of Burlington. He d. 10 Feb., 1847, at Burlington, unm.

4080. Jedediah, b. 14 Jan., 1788, at South Hero. He m. 13 Jan., 1811, Sarah Gilman, b. 7 Jan., 1796, at Vershire, Vt., daughter of Jonathan Gilman and Susanna Dudley of Grand Isle. He was a farmer, and they settled at Grand Isle, where he d. 26 April, 1845; and where she was living in 1856. They had eleven children, all born at Grand Isle.

SOME OF GEORGE SOULE'S INDIAN FRIENDSSAMOSET

There were at least four individual Indians who were close friends with the Pilgrims. One famous Indian was the Great Sachem, (Chief), of the Wampanowogs. This assures us that George was very familiar with the Indians and their ways.

The first acquaintance the Pilgrims made was with a handsome man called Samoset. On a fair warm day in March 1621, Miles Standish had called George Soule, John Alden, and John Howland along with all the other stronger men together to finish some military orders they had started before but had been interrupted. Suddenly the men looked up to see a nearly naked savage. They were alarmed, but they watched as he walked on very boldly between the newly built houses. He presented himself to them where they stood and said in perfect English, "Welcome"! Can you imagine the surprise and amazement George felt?

We know Samoset was handsome because the Pilgrims called him "seemly", a word which meant the same.

"He said his name was Samoset" we read from Bradford's Journal. "And he was not of these parts, but from Mortiggon, it lying a days sail with great wind, and five days if by land"

He had learned English from the English fishermen who came to fish at Monhiggan Island. He had come to Plymouth eight months before. The wind came up a little and they put a coat about his shoulders as he wore only a leather about his waist with a fringe about a span long. He was a tall straight man, the hair of his head black, long behind, short before and no hair on his face at all. He carried a bow and two arrows, one headed and one unheaded.

They talked all afternoon with him and when he did not choose to leave they decided to put him on shipboard for the night as a safety measure. The Mayflower lay at anchor in the bay. They went to the shallop, but the wind was high and the tiderunning out so they lodged him that night at Stephen Hopkins house. They watched him throughout the night but he slept soundly and left in the morning. He left with a promise to return later with a friend of his who could speak even better English than he. He said the name of his friend was Squanto. Next time we will meet the wonderful Squanto who helped the Pilgrims so much.

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George Soule's house at Plymouth was at the farthest point from the fort. It tells us that George was a person who could be depended upon to guard the outer edge of the area and spread the alarm if need be. He would have had to be level headed and brave.
