

GEORGE SOULE

by John Soule and Milton E. Terry

[The Descendants of George Soule, carefully researched and compiled by Col. John Soule and Dr. Milton E. Terry, and edited by Anne Borden Harding, will comprise Volume Three of Mayflower Families. Publication is expected in Spring 1980. The first chapter, slightly condensed, is presented here.]

 George¹ Soule was born in England probably between 1593 and 1600. He died in Duxbury before 22 Jan. 1679 (O.S.), when his inventory was taken by Edward Southworth and Thomas Delano. The tentative dates for his birth are based on his signing of the Mayflower Compact in 1620 and his death in 1679. As a signer of the Compact, he must have been twenty, the known age of Gilbert Winslow. Since a life span of eighty-five was rare in those days, he was born probably not much earlier than 1593.

The wife whom he married, probably in Plymouth before 1626, was Mary Bucket (?Becket) who arrived in Plymouth before 31 July 1623 aboard the Anne. She died in Duxbury in December 1676. She has not been identified further.

Extensive searches have been made in English parish records but despite all these investigations the parentage and birthplace of George Soule are still undiscovered. A most interesting and thought provoking article by Roland P. Soule on a possible father of George Soule appeared in the Soule Kindred Newsletter for October 1978. The search still goes on.

George Soule joined, probably in London, a company of adventurers off to the New World. His status is clearly established as a "servant" to relatively wealthy Pilgrim Edward Winslow, and also as a signer of the famed Mayflower Compact of 11 Nov. 1620, Old Style. It appears logical, therefore, to assume that Winslow bore the cost of George Soule's passage to Plymouth aboard the Mayflower. The original New Plymouth Colony Records, William Bradford's Of Plimoth Plantation, 1620-1647, Plymouth Registry of Deeds and Probates, Bristol County Registry of Deeds, Plymouth Town Records, Duxbury Town Records and other authoritative sources provide sufficient evidence upon which to base a comprehensive sketch of George Soule's life in New England. Unlike some of his colleagues, he never returned to his homeland. However, suffice it to say that he became a relatively well-to-do leader, business man and office holder in Plymouth Colony. As early as July 1627 George Soule was one of a group of fifty-eight "Purchasers or Old Comers" who assumed Plymouth Colony's debt to "The Adventurers," the promoters and capitalists who financed the voyage of the Mayflower and other early ventures and expenses of the colony. In return, the group received profitable trading concessions in Maine, at Cape Ann, on Buzzard's Bay and subsequently on the Connecticut River. The General Court voted 5 March 1639/40 to pay these "Purchasers or Old Comers" for the surren-

der of their patent. Existing land records show that he acquired extensive holdings in Duxbury, Dartmouth, Middleboro, Marshfield and Bridgewater but resided only in Plymouth and Duxbury, or "Ducksburrow" as it was called originally.

On 27 Sept. 1642 he appeared before the General Court as one of two "Deputies" or representatives from Duxbury, Plymouth Colony having established representative government in 1639, after finding it no longer practicable to have all of the colonists participate as individuals. The representatives were limited to terms of one year and denied the right of succession, so we find George Soule serving each alternate year for many years, with increasing assignments such as forming a committee 26 Oct. 1646 with Anthony Thatcher "to draw up an order concerning disorderly

drinking of tobacco."

Early in 1637 the Pequot Indians "fell openly upon the English at Connecticut." In response to a plea for assistance, the Plymouth General Court agreed forthwith to send fifty men. George Soule volunteered for this service 7 June 1637, as one of forty-two men under Lieutenant William Holmes, with the Reverend Thomas Prence as chaplain, "but when they were ready to march . . . they had word to stay; for the enemy was as good as vanquished and there would be no need." The Society of Colonial Wars recognizes the eligibility for membership of any descendant of George Soule by reason of this service which, strictly speaking, was not performed. An eye witness also identified one "George Soule, Sr." as having occupied the fort at Middleboro for six weeks in 1675, during King Philip's War. Admitting that Pilgrim George Soule was an original proprietor of Middleboro, the disposal of his property there in 1668 and his advancing age, lend credibility to the theory that the member of the fort party was actually the Pilgrim's son, George Soule (1639-1704).

The will of George Soule, probated in 1679, reads:

In the Name of God Amen I George Soule senir of Duxbury in the collonie of New Plymouth in New England being aged and weake of body but of sound mind and Memory praised be God Doe make this my last Will and Testament in Manor and forme following Imprimis - I comitt my soule into the hands of Almighty God whoe Gave it and my body to be Decently buried in the place appointed for that use whensoever hee shall please to take me hence; and for the Disposall of my outward estate which God of his Goodness hath Given mee first I have and already formerly by Deeds under my hand and seale Given unto my two sonnes Nathaniel: and Gorge All my lands in the Township of Dartmouth; Item I have formerly Given unto my Daughters Elizabeth and Patience all my lands in the Township of Middleberry Item I give and bequeath unto my Daughters Susannah and Mary twelve pence a peece to be paid by my executor hereafter Named after my Decease; And forasmuch as my Eldest son John Soule and his family hath in my extreme old age and weakness bin tender and careful of mee and very healpful to mee; and is likely soe to be while it shall please God to continew my life heer therefore I give and bequeath unto my said son John Soule all the Remainder of my housing and lands whatsoever to him his heirs and Assigns forever Item I Give and bequeath unto my son John all my goods and Chattles whatsoever Item I Nominate and appoint my

son John Soule to be my sole Executor of this my last will and Testament; lastly I doe heerby make Null and voyde all other and former wills and Testaments by mee att Any time made; and Declare this instrument to be my last Will and Testament In Witness whereof I the said Gorge Soule have heerunto sett my hand and seale this eleventh Day of August in the year of our Lord one Thousand six hundred seaventy and seaven:

GORGE SOULE and a seale

The above named Gorge Soule did signe seale and Deliver this Instrument to be his Last Will and Testament in the presence of us Nathaniel Thomas The Marke D T of Deborah Thomas

Apparently, as often happens in families when property is concerned, son John Soule was displeased with the amount of property given to his sister Patience. His displeasure came to the notice of his father who delivered this caveat in a codicil:

Item the twentyeth Day of September 1677 I the above Named Gorge Soule Doe heerby further Declare that it is my will that if my son John Soule above named or his heirs or Assignes or any of them shall att any time Disturbe my Daughter Patience or her heirs or Assignes or any of them in peacable Posession or Injoyment of the lands I have given her att Namassaket allies Middleberry and Recover the same from her or her heires or Assignes or any of them That then my Gift to my son John Soule shalbe void; and that then my will is my Daughter Patience shall have all my lands att Duxburrey And shee shalbe my sole executrix of this my last Will and Testament And enter into my housing lands and meddowes att Duxburrow. In witness where I have heerunto sett my hand and seale;

The order of birth of the children of Pilgrim George Soule is not known. It is established that Zachariah was the first born; John was 75 years old in 1707; George, Jr., was 34 years old in 1673; Patience's last child was born in 1691; and Elizabeth was in trouble in 1663. Pilgrim George had but eight children as of 1650. An unpublished note of Robert S. Wakefield develops an acceptable ordering which will be used in this volume.

THE NEW MAYFLOWER ANCESTRAL INDEX

by Elizabeth P. White and Milton E. Terry

The new Mayflower Ancestral Index project is now sufficiently far enough along to issue a first report. An official index, by its very nature, requires two distinctly separate responsible officers, one to ensure correct authorized content, and the other to produce and distribute a book properly printed. Our constitution and by-laws gives to the Historian General the responsibility and authority to accept a lineage as correct and accurate, or to reject it as unproven. A rejected lineage is one in which the presentation of proof and supporting documentation have not yet met the requirements of our Society.

Each line in an official index must have the approval of the Historian General. One cannot expect to improve the quality of an Index after it has been completed. Therefore, procedures have been established in the beginning to attempt to isolate all inconsistencies at the input stage, with a goal of ninety-nine per cent entered lines error-free. If this can be obtained, then proofing, followed by editing, can achieve a goal of no major errors, with minor errors of less than one per thousand lines. The early experiments of the Index Committee working on the new Mayflower Ancestral Index had an error rate of about two per cent, but further tightening of entry procedures achieved an error rate below one-half of one per cent.

Each anomaly is referred to Historian General Anne Harding who then authorizes the information which is to be used in the Index. Anomalies are of two types. One is clerical, such as misspelled names and illegible names. The other is more serious — a lineage element is challenged by an accepted source or authority such as Mayflower Families, Volumes One or Two. The data entry group is responsible for recognizing the anomaly in a lineage and will not enter the questioned element or subsequent elements of such a lineage into the database. The Historian General has established a group of experts, called referees, who will examine the evidence in the Society's files and will compare it with that offered by the authority. The referees will then come to a decision and will make a recommendation to the Historian General, who will then issue a ruling.

A mini-index will be made for each of the following family groups to be included in Volume I: Samuel Fuller, Francis Eaton, William White, James Chilton, Richard More, Thomas Rogers, George Soule and William Brewster. The recently appointed Editor, Alden G. Beaman, will become responsible for bringing each mini-index to the highest level of accuracy. When all of the corrections and checks have been made, a final mini-index will be typed which Editor Beaman will present to Historian General Harding for approval.

The Publications Committee has appointed Harlan C. Thomas, Governor of the Illinois Society, to take charge of the Index. A publisher must be

selected and financing established. The size of the page, the number of lines per page, font style and grade of paper must be defined. The copyright laws must be followed and an advertising and marketing program must be established. A costing of the project must be made and a price for the book established. Jointly with the Editor and the Historian General, the page format must be approved and the content of the preliminary pages which make up such a book must be specified and produced. Finally, Editor Beaman, the technical staff and Mr. Thomas will schedule the production of camera-ready copy which the Editor will prepare and deliver to the printer. The result will be an accurate, up-to-date Mayflower Ancestral Index which will be indispensable to State Society Historians, genealogists and everyone interested in descendants of the Mayflower Pilgrims.

THE GEORGE SOULE DAUGHTERS STORY SUSANNA, MARY, ELIZABETH and PATIENCE SOULE

George Soule was probably born in England about 1597. He was listed in Bradford's story of the Pilgrims crossing on the Mayflower as being With Edward Winslow. He brought his wife and "2 men servants, caled Georg Sowle and Elias Story"

In 1623 George Soule was allotted one acre "on the South side of the brooke to the baywards." He acquired several more pieces of land, at Fowder Foint and Duxbury. Some of his land is still in Soule related families.

He married Mary Bucket (Beckett) sometime after 1623 when she came to America on the ship Anne.

His will was probated in 1679 and in it he left land or money to all his children. All were named in this will. He left his daughters Elizabeth and Fatience land and daughters Susannah and Mary money.

Susanna Soule was born about 1642, Mary Soule was born about 1644, Elizabeth Soule was born about 1645 and Patience Soule was born about 1648, so this story will be given of each daughter in order of their birth.

SUSANNA SOULE

Susanna (Susannah) Soule, daughter of George and Mary Soule was born about 1642 and probably at Duxbury, she died after 1684 probably at Kings Towne, Rhode Island. She married Francis West, who was born in England. They resided at Kings Towne, R.I. which later became North Kingstown.

In Soule Newsletter, Vol. II, No. 1, Fages 13-23 is the story of the proof of Susanna Soule's marriage to Francis est. "It is probable that Francis mest lived in Duxbury, Mass., before settling at North Kingstown....Susanna and Francis west had a large family and many grandchildren.....

"my great grandfather Francis West came from Europe to Amarica after the first settlement of Plymouth and soon after his arrival he married a young lady by the name of Sole, daughter of Mr. George Sole...my grandfather was William West...."

The children of Francis and Susannah (Soule) west were all born in North Kingstown, Rhode Island. They were:

MARY SOULE

Mary Soule, daughter of George and Mary Soule was born about 1644 and probably at Duxbury, she died after 1720, Flymouth, Mass. She was "bound out" to John Winslow. This was often done in that period of time.

She married probably about 1666 and probably at Duxbury, to John Peterson. He died about 1720 as his will was proven 26 March, 1720. He was buried on. property at Powder Point, property received from George Soule.

The children of John and Mary (Soule) Peterson were all probably born in Duxbury. They were:

ELIZABETH SOULE

Elizabeth Soule, daughter of George and Mary Soule was born about 1045 and probably at Duxbury, she died in early 1700's, before 1702, probably in soodbridge, Middlesex County, New Jersey.

She married before 23 July 1668 as on that date her father deeded land to "Francis Walker, husband of my daughter, Elizabeth," in Middleboro. They moved to Duxbury in 1672, also moved to other areas, then settled in woodbridge, N.J. about 1:83-84 and he was constable in 1688.

The children of Francis and Elizabeth (Soule) walker were all probably born in Plymouth Colony and probably in the mid-1660's. They were:

- 1. Francis Walker, Jr., married Anne Wells
- 2. Mary walker, married John Ayres
- 3. Isaac walker, married Desire Shelley
- 4. Patience Walker, married Francis Drake

PATIENCE SOULE

Patience Soule, daughter of George and Mary Soule was born about 1648 probably at Duxbury, she died 11 March 1705/6 at Middleboro, Mass. She married John Haskell in Middleboro in January 1666. He was the son of Roger and Elizabeth (Hardy) Haskell. He was born probably at Salem, Mass. about 1640 and died at Middleboro 15 May 1706.

Fatience (Soule) Haskell received land from her father in Middleboro, settled and died there.

The children of John and Patience (Soule) Haskell were all born in Middleboro. They were:

Thank you for your letter of March 20. Another Soule - Mr. Roland P. Soule, 1614 Cherry Hills Drive, Sun City Center, Florida 33570 - has some very strong ideas about the number of Mayflower descendants in the country today. Perhaps you would like to correspond with him... He feels, as you do, that the Winton-Godofsky estimate is much too large to be valid.

I had no idea that the November issue would stir up so much heated controversy. The truth about how many Mayflower descendants are alive today cannot be settled until the Five-Generations Project has been finished. Then, in spite of the many children who have to be labelled "no further record" simply because there is no way of telling where they went, or whether they died young only then will we have enough information to surmise with any certainty how many people with Mayflower genes are walking the streets today. Until then, we can only guess.

Dear Mr. Soule

Concerning your letter to the Editor of 26 March 79, I am answering as an interested onlooker at the discussion of Mayflower descendants, and think that Mr. Godofsky's approach is correct.

Your telephone directory survey of Soule names ignores the factor of intermarriage with outsiders, which of course, may be other than Godofsky"s figures. Suppose that in 1670 all Mayflower descendants were of Mayflower families and none other. Then suppose that that year they all decided to marry outsiders, assuming also an equal number of boys and girls, there would be twice as many women bearing Mayflower children, even though genetically halved. The proportion of Mayflower names would be halved; and this halving would continue at each subsequent generation, as long as this extreme practice continued.

I take it that Godofsky's intermarriage factor multiplied by two gives the increased number of women due to outsiders for each generation. As the number of outside women increases, so does the number of outside husbands with strange names.

Starting with 100% Mayflower names in 1670 and dividing down generation by generation by this marriage factor times two, we come to 0.316% from the maximum table and 0.174% for the minimum by 1951. Continuing for another generation at the same rate, the figures are 0.269% and 0.135% respectively.

If there are now 2500 male Soules (or Whatever better figure you know) and if this figure is divided by these percentages, you have 900,000 and 1,800,000 as the minimum and maximum number of male Soule descendants or cousins today (plus fathers and grandfathers).


These figures, multiplied by 2-3, are very roughly in line with Godofsky's and show the great importance of the rate of intermarriage, until it becomes difficult to encounter an outsider and saturation occurs.

FURTHER NOTES ON THE 1979 PENSACOLA REUNION

Sixty-eight Soules and friends gathered on Florida's Gulf Coast for a funfilled reunion Aug. 9-12, 1979. They came from California, South Florida, upper New York State and many points in between to renew old acquaintances and make new ones. Party planners had a wonderful experience meeting so many of our "distant cousins."

A change in Col. John's medication sent his blood pressure on a roller coaster so he stayed home in the air conditioned comfort of his Virginia apartment while some 32 members of his family came from Iowa, Ohio, Alabama and Georgia to join the Pensacola bunch for a "reunion within a reunion". All six of brother Bill's

children came as did most of Bill's grandchildren.

A dozen or so local Soules joined 24 visitors for a delightful welcome party and an informal get-acquainted time. By bedtime we knew who was a Soule, Soule' or Soules as well as putting names of those whose names no longer were Soule(s). By reunion end we had five who were Bill Soule -- Bill Soule, Sr., of Pensacola; Bill Jr. and III or Sioux City, Iowa and two by the name of Bill Soule' from Missouri City, Texas.

NAS TOUR INCLUDES MUSEUMS

Friday morning 22 boarded a bus for a tour of the Naval Air Station -- taking a short historical turn around the station which dates to the early days of the State of Florida. We stopped at both the survival museum, with its tropical vegetation and animals, and at the aerospace museum to see airplanes from 1914 to jets. Bill Soule' enjoyed showing his two children the station where he was in the Navy. All marveled at the huge aircraft carrier, Lexington, which is truly a small floating city!

FISH, HUSH PUPPIES AND GHOSTS

To each his own "thing" until 4:30 in the afternoon. We got into a caravan of cars for a trip to Santa Rosa Island and a Pensacola treat -- a fish fry with hush puppies and the caterer's special deep fried onions. Many of us ate too much! A candlelight tour of Ft. Pickens followed the picnic supper. Forts have guarded Pensacola Bay since the 17th century, although the earliest structures still in existence were built shortly after America took possession of the area in 1821.

The NAS was clearly visible until dark and we could see where we had been, including a good view of the carrier. We had seen Ft. Pickens in the morning for at this point the bay is not very wide. Pickens and the mainland forts, located

on NAS are all part of the Gulf Islands National Seashore.

At least two people, Milton Terry and Linda Soule Preston, took a short swim in Pensacola Bay while our fish was cooked. The children enjoyed the program which

was told by two "ghosts" who returned from the 1860s.

Our plans had included a talk on Pensacola from its 1559 founding to the time when the Americans came in 1821; however, the noise changed our plans for the other lunch guests and their converstaion echoed though the room, thus a talk was not possible. We had planned for Betty Soule Merritt, Col. John's sister, to do the talking -- she had been tour guide on both tours and we just said she was tired of talking (she wasn't).

We had a great dinner party with 54 persons there. Ladies came all dressed up, some in costumes including Sally Harrison in a Fiesta of Five Flags Spanish dress. We sat at small tables, decorated with candles and revolutionary period American flags, with place cards to "mix us up".

Johnny Soule Preston, as the fiesty founder of Cincinnati, gave an exerpt from a school play. Dedicated to his grandfather, Col. John, he enlisted help from several "cousins" and did a great job putting a final touch to a good evening!

After a brief meeting, introductions of all who were there, we enjoyed seeing

the slides of the Soule Family from France to Plymouth. They were shown by George Soule' of New Orleans, LA., who was George Soule in Philadelphia.

PLANNERS FIND BONUS

Party planners experienced some special satisfactions when Margaret Jernagan Hall and daughter Helen Correll got to know Mary Oliver Soule during early meetings. And later, when Margaret's lineage appeared in the April Newsletter she received a letter from Brig. Gen. Hal Cushman Pattison, Fairfax, VA., who was a closer cousin than some. It seems that his grandmother and Margaret's great-grandmother were sisters and he knew little of his grandmother's family. He didn't make the reunion but we hopw they will meet soon.

And again, a special plus when Lucille Soule Hackett, Mobile, Ala., made reservations for the seminar she learned of the Reunion. Lucille, who has few close reatives left, had a great time with all her new found cousins.



Genealogy: Today's Gift to the Future

You've been gathering family history for years. Locating ancestral roots has been both challenging and rewarding. Spending hours sorting through collections in libraries or leaning against a porch railing, tape recorder in hand, while a lone survivor of another era "tells about the family" as she knew it have been well worth the time and effort invested.

But finding that information when you need it at a moment's notice is a different matter. Every memory jogger that you felt would be your "open sesame" has failed you. You know you've got it...somewhere. But where?

You come to a point where you don't know where to look next. Was your greatgrandmother wasn't ever born at all.

Or you have a missing link in your family tree, dating back to the 1700's, that originated in the Carolinas. Where do you look next. And how can you find the help you need?

Headaches like those, which many would-be family historians have, don't have to be the plague that accompanies the pleasure of unearthing ancestral treasures of the past, long forgotten and almost lost.

Area chapters of Daughters of the American Revolution think they have a few of the solutions. Members of Pensacola and Fort Pickens chapters are joining together to sponsor a one-day seminar on Thursday at Pensacola's Sheraton Inn.

Open to the public and available for both intermediate and/or advanced students, it begins at 9:30 a.m. and ends at 4 p.m.

According to seminar coordinator Mary Dawkins, enrollment is limited and preregistration is suggested. "Cail Barbara Boyd at 433-1851 or Odessa Garrison at 477-4921 to make sure there's still room for reservations," she says.

Guest lecturers for the seminar will be Col. John Soule, McLean, Va., and Dr. Milton Terry, Mountainside, N.J., co-author of volume III of "Mayflower Families through Five Generations," and active members of the Society of Mayflower Descendants.

Dr. Terry is president of Soule Kindred of America and Col. Soule is founder.

According to Dawkins, SKA was formed 12 years ago to assist persons interested in joining Mayflower Society to establish lineage to George Soule of the Mayflower.

"The organization also has provided excellent assistance as a tool in gather much information on the descendants of this pilgrim," Dawkins says.

The genealogical background of the seminar conductors is extensive, Dawkins reports. "Together, Col. Soule and Dr. Terry have more than a half-century of experience in genealogical research.

have had two or three since. We've had birds, too, but have just one parakeet now."



Indians thankful for nothing at all

PLYMOUTH, Mass. (AP) - Led by a trumpet-playing descendant of the tribe that greeted the Pilgrims 359 years ago, a small band of Indians is planning a 24-hour fast to mourn Thanksgiving.

"It's important that this doesn't come out as a protest," said the leader, Frank James, moderator of a nine-year-old organization called the United American Indians of New

"We're not radicals. We're mourning all the injustices to the American Indian in the past and today. The native American has nothing to be thankful for," he said Tuesday.

"We're telling people that the Indians are still here, that the injustices of the past are still going on ...," James said.

"I think what should be done is make people realize that Thanksgiving Day is purely for the merchants to hoodwink everybody in the country into going out and buying a big meal

... when the guy next door is starving," said James.

He also criticized what he calls the "myth" of Pilgrim-Indianfriendship the first Thanksgiving in this first settlement in the fall of 1621 was supposed to mark.

"The glorious relationship," James said. "The Indians supplied all the food for the first Thanksgiving. The Pilgrims in-

vited five Indians and 90 showed up.' He said Massasoit, the Wampanoag Indian chief, was given "drinks of strong water" and was "sweating profusely" when he signed that first friendship treaty with the Pilgrims.

James and fellow Indians will gather Thursday at the statue of Massasoit overlooking Plymouth harbor to end their fast at

"We are going to tell the truth," said James. "Over 350 years ago, the Pilgrims came to our shores, took our land and killed our ancestors."
