





### Historic Fort Snelling



Built on a commanding bluff above the Mississippi and Minnesota rivers more than 150 years ago, Fort Snelling was for over thirty years the guardian of American interests in the upper Northwest. It was the center of government policy and administration in the years before Minnesota statehood and a haven for explorers and other travelers who sought society within its limestone walls. Now restored to its original appearance and staffed with costumed guides, the fort again welcomes visitors who come to learn about life in Minnesota in the early years of the nineteenth

In beautiful Minnehaha Park set amid 144 acres of rolling woodland in south Minneapolis, are the majestic, cascading Minnehaha Falls right, cascading Minnehaha Falls right, immortalised by Longfellow in his famous poem "Song of Hiawatha". Flowing from its source at Lake Minnetonka, the crystal creek tumbles 53 feet in a powerful arch and joins the Mississippi River through a wooded gorge below the falls. Providing an excellent venue for various festivals, Minnehaha Park is the scene of the Swedish Festival's Svenskarnas Dag top left, held in June.



#### FAMILY HISTORIAN'S REPORT

Here's a bit on EDWARD SOWL, #483 pp. 210-211, Mayflower Families-3. A search of the Tolland CT land records and our files has produced two new facts about this man. Joanna (Baker?) Sowl died before 1764, since the Marriage Intentions Records of Middleboro (still unpublished) note Joanna Benson to Edward Sowl 1764. Thus, the four youngest children, all daughters, are by his second wife, Joanna Benson. The land records show that Edward Sowl of Scituate RI on 7 March 1772 bought 60 acres in Tolland. But an astonishing record LBook 6:3551 quoted: "To Selectmen of Tolland to let you know that Edward Sowl of Tolland is a member of a Baptist Church in Scituate under the pastors care of Nathan Young, Elder. To let you know that he is wholesome Order [sic] and in full fellowship with the church." Town Clerk, Scituate RI, recorded 30 March 1774. So now we know why no church records from the various towns wherein he lived contain any mention of his family. A search for the Scituate Baptist records will be made.

Two land records shed some light of Edward's son William. On 28 May 1782, he of Wilbraham bought land from James Hammond; on 3 Feb 1783 he, of Tolland, sold it back to James Hammond of Wilbraham.

Shortly before his death Feb. 14, 1985 [See obit., p. 67], William Soule of American Fork, Utah, had written your historian. He sent information regarding William Soule (#443, p.196, MF-3). There had been a request to find the correct parentage of William Soule, "The Loyalist" of Alburgh, VT. (#443). Most historians have been convinced that William was the son of Deacon Ezekiel and Hannah (Delano) Soule, born at Duxbury, MA 4 Sep 1738, died at Alburgh, VT 23 Mar 1811. [From town records of Woolwich ME]

Recently a gravestone was discovered in Harpswell, Cumberland Co., Maine. On it is the inscription: William Soule, son of Deacon Ezekiel and Mrs. Hannah Soule, of Duxborough, Died July 5, 1754, in his 17th year [birth year 1737/38] This would refute earlier published information about the parentage of William the Loyalist.

The parentage of William the Loyalist is indeed a mystery at this time. We would welcome further research by any descendants, or someone with access to Vermont records, to try to find the ancestors.

The 12th anniversary of the Supreme Court decision that legalized abortion passed without the violence some had feared, but with the certainty that both sides would be fighting through another year and demonstrating again next year.

"However sweet our victory now, the only approach we can have now is endless pressure . . . so stay with us," Democratic state Rep. Jolene Unsoeld told 100 abortion rights advocates in Olympia, Wash.

"We're going to continue to take a stand," Nelson Cooney of Project Life told 350 shivering marchers at the South Carolina Statehouse on Tuesday, anniversary of the 1973 court ruling legalizing abor-

The biggest demonstration was in the nation's capital, where 71,000 people marched to the Supreme Court after hearing Presi-dent Reagan support their cause. But supporters and foes of legalized abortion press-ed their case in dozens of state capitals, at family planning clinics and churches from Arizona to Maine and Oregon to Alabama.

"Reagan and Bush won so big partly because of their pro-life stand and Mondale and Farraro lost so badly precisely because of their pro-abortion position," Dr. J.C. Willise, president of the National Right To Life Committee, said in Washington.

"We hope that this continuing shift in public opinion will be evident to our elected officials," he said.

At many clinics there was tight security because of bombings at 24 such facilities in the last year, and fears that the anniver-sary would invite more.

In an address by telephone to the Washington rally, Reagan declared: "We cannot condone the threatening or taking of human life to protest the taking of human life by way of abortion."

"Tam convinced that our response to the 12th anniversary ... must be to re-dedicate ourselves to ending the terrible national tragedy of shortler." tragedy of abortion.





#### SOME WISCONSIN SOWLS

IEd. note: At the 1981 Plymouth Reunion I met Frank and Juliette Sowl of Madison, WI, and became aware of the existence of a SOWL family in this state. There seemed to be no connection with my SOWLE family, but I promised to keep searching. Finally, in checking the Preliminary Index I found a link from Elijah Sowl to William Sowl, and from there back to George. The lineage is: George<sup>1</sup>, Nathaniel<sup>2</sup>, Sylvanus<sup>3</sup> SOWLE, William<sup>4</sup>, Edward<sup>5</sup> SOWL, William<sup>4</sup>, Elijah<sup>7</sup>, William<sup>6</sup>, David A.<sup>7</sup>, Franklin Charles<sup>10</sup>, Frank Keith<sup>12</sup>, Alexander Frederick Sowl<sup>13</sup>. The story which follows was written by Juliette, wife of Frank Junior Sowl.]

Our known history begins with Elijah and Lucinda Sowl, married in MA in 1809. They emigrated west, to Geauga County, Ohio in 1819, acquiring 100 acres there. Lucinda's father, Revolutionary Soldier John Smith, and other family members came earlier, about 1817. (Land comprising Geauga County was claimed by Connecticut under a charter of 1662.) For reasons unknown, Elijah and Lucinda again emigrated, this time to Lafayette County, WI in 1842, again becoming pioneers. Of this was said, "As early as 1836 nearly all the land in the Town of Argyle (in Lafayette Co.) was entered by a company of eastern capitalists, organized for this purpose. It disposed of its title to farmers emigrating west. Owing to inducements offered by this company, in 1839, a settlement formed on Mud Branch, 2 miles from Argyle. Among them were Robert Threadgold and Elijah Sowl. Here, along the bottoms and among the hills of Mud Branch, these hardy pioneers erected cabins and cultivated farms."

The children of Elijah and Lucinda were John (b. 1809), Lyman (b. 181?), Caroline (b. 1818), William (b. 1820), Marilla (b. 1827), Joseph (b. 1832 d. 1848). All these emigrated with their parents. William, of our line, had married Frances Barrows (b. 1820), in Cleveland, Ohio in 1840. Their first son, Charles Shumway, was born along the route in IL in 1841. The others were born in Argyle. James (b. 1843) and Lucius (b. 1845d) both died in the Civil War. Mary (b. 1846), Luisa (b. 1849, David (b. 1850), Allen (b. 1854), and George (b. 1856) of the 13 born to William and Frances lived and left survivors.

Wisconsin became a state in 1848; however, the southeastern part of Lafayette County was slow in settling because of the number of Indians there who found it a paradise for trapping, hunting and fishing. After 1851 the advantages of Argyle became better known to immigrants and vast numbers of Norwegians flocked into it, opening up small farms together. Argyle thrived until the panic of 1857.

From "Early Records of Town of Argyle", we read that William Sowl, a Justice of the Peace, owned 80 improved acres, 40 unimproved, with a cash value of \$800. His other assets were \$75 in implements, 1 horse, 7 milk cows, 2 oxen, 27 sheep, 9 swine (value \$150), 150 bushels wheat, 100 of Indian corn and 300 oats. In the obituary he was described as a faithful Christian, a good citizen, a kind husband and parent.

A pioneer at heart, William had also acquired a farm in South Dakota and requested to be buried there. His son David later settled in South Dakota also, but HIS son Franklin Charles remained in Argyle to become a cheesemaker and farmer. Of HIS sons, Frank Junior, this research became a reality because I married him. In true spirit of the pioneer, we bought a farm in 1976 on Madeline Island in Lake Superior and it was there last August 19 that the last SOWL reunion was held. (We raised 4 sons in Monona.) There were 72 Sowls at the reunion (25 from David's line), coming from Georgia, Mississippi, California, Illinois, North and South Dakota, Minnesota and Wisconsin.

Elijah and Lucinda, along with many other family members, are buried in a unique little family cemetery on top of a hill in Mud Branch. Twice before part of our reunions has been a pilgrimage to this cemetery, and plans have been made for another on the 3rd Saturday in August, 1985, at Argyle.

I am looking for the birthplace and parents of Elizabeth SOULE, b. ca. 1783, m. ca 1800, d. 20 May 1829 prob. Butternuts, Otsego Co., NY, buried in South New Berlin, Chenango Co., NY. Her husband was Joseph Bassett, b. 13 Dec 1778, Coventry, RI, moved to Otsego about 1797, d. there 14 Dec 1862; his second wife was Eliza Wightman, but Elizabeth Soule was the mother of his children.

One clue we have as to her parents is from the Soule book by Ridlon, p. 1098, which says that her children are listed as some of the legal heirs of John Soule, who died 22 Nov 1850 in Greene, Chenango Co., NY. He died childless, so all the legal heirs were listed. Other than his wife Abigail, the only heirs listed were Hannah Soule, his sister, who was the second wife of Erastus Burr (she is buried in the same cemetary as Elizabeth, and her birth date is c. 1786, d. 31 Oct 1867), and the children of his deceased sister Elizabeth. Census information indicates that John & Hannah were born in RI, possibly to a D. Soule.

## 'Father's Farm' tells of by-gone West Waldoboro

by Pam Derringer Imagine living on a Waldoboro farm today with no phone, no television or radio and no transportation.

transportation.

The isolation of rural life in the early 1900's is very real in "Father's Farm," a local history published last year by Waldoboro native Esther Soile Gross.

Esther was born in 1904 on a 75-zere West Waldoboro farm with fields that rolled down to the Medomak River; the land had been in her family for five generations.

Travel by a team of horses was slow back then, with an eight to 10 mile journey talking about I too hours. Families with oxen walked where they needed to go, others near the river

where they needed to go; others near the river rowed, she wrote.
Without snowplows, roads were shoveled clear two or three days after a heavy snowstorm by large crews of men, she said.
A doctor making house calls would travel as far as he could on horsebock, then leave the animal in the nearest barn and proceed on snowshoes. Gross said:

snowshoes, Gross said.
Automobiles were left on blocks for the winter, she added.
Christmas was celebrated by the family at

home; it was too far away to join the grand-parents in North Waldoboro she said.
Esther got her first store-bought coat at the age of 11, and took her first train ride to Rockland to get it.
Isolation forced people to be independent;

Isolation forced people to be independent; Esther's family grew most of its own food and slaughtered a loog before the holidays as the staple of its winter ment supply, she said. Us-ing eggs and cream to make lee cream except for special occasions was considered "ex-travagant," she added.

Home remedies and first aid were assential since a doctor couldn't be summoned for at least an hour or two

When Esther's uncle cut his foot with an ax while chopping wood, her grandmothes cleansed the wound and sewed it up with white silk thread, she said.

Pleasures were simple, too. Neighbors drop-ped in for an afternoon visit and friends or relatives would stay for dinner. The church was a gathering spot with Suniay services and midweek prayer meetings, Christmas and Easter concerts, strawberry festivals and baked-bean

suppers. Several small stores had public halls on the second floor where public dances were given, but they were somewhat frowned upon because they tended to bring together a rowdy element, she wrote.

Youngsters went skating and sliding in the winter, and other outdoor activities in the summer. There were parties; some families had a piano, organ or Victrola and records.

"It wasn't dull, really; we know no other way,"

she wrote.
The one-room schoolhouse was just down the

road. There was a big woodstove in the middle that kept the children warm except in the coldest weather, when they were allowed to gather around it to study and recite. The building was constructed before 1885 and burned in 1917.

Gross singled out the late Agnes Creamer as
one of her best teachers.
Miss Creamer promoted better hygiene by
abolishing the common water bucket, making
students bring their own cups and encouraging
them to brush their teeth. She obtained a piano,
built bookshelves, raised money for a school
library and took students on bird walks.
"Some of the prevent thought that school

"Some of the parents thought that school work should be confined to the three R's, as in their own day, and frowned upon Miss Agnes' innovations as a waste of time but they were wrong," Gross concluded.
