
What In The World Is The SKFTD? And Why Are We So Excited About It?

ome of you may have heard a reference to the **SKFTD**, but most of you probably have not. Well, **SKFTD** is the somewhat unwieldy acronym for the **Soule Kindred Family Tree Database**, Soule Kindred's newest venture. Just what is the **Soule Kindred Family Tree Database**, you ask? We'll get to that in a minute but, first, a little history.

In 1926, Rev. Gideon T. Ridlon published A contribution to the history, biography and genealogy of the families named Sole, Solly, Soule, Sowle, Soulis, with other forms of spelling: from the eighth century to the present, with notes on collateral families, both foreign and American. Soule Kindred was founded in 1967 to update Rev. Ridlon's story of George Soule's descendants and in 1980, as part of the General Society of Mayflower Descendants Five Generations project, Volume III, Mayflower Families Through Five Generations: George Soule, co-authored by Soule Kindred Historian, Col. John E. Soule, and Soule Kindred President, Dr. Milton E. Terry, was published. Work has continued with additional updates published in 1999 (Wakefield), 2005 (Throop), 2006 (Throop) & 2011 (Throop). Additionally, in 2002, former Soule Kindred Historian, Jack Sowles, in an effort to begin computerizing information from the Soule Kindred archives, created CDs containing various indices of Soule descendants and spouses.

As the history above shows, creating and making available the complete Soule lineage has been a goal (dream?) of Soule Kindred from the beginning. Now, in 2014, technology finally allows Soule Kindred members to literally work together to build the complete Soule family tree, branch by branch and descendant by descendant to make the "dream" a reality.



The **Soule Kindred Family Tree Database** is a genealogy software application purchased by, and modified for, Soule Kindred in America. Essentially, it is a genealogy program similar to the Family Tree Maker, Legacy Family Tree, or Reunion program you use at home for your personal genealogy. The SKFTD has been in development and testing for over two years and is now ready for use by the entire membership.

Why are we so excited about this? Because for the first time, Soule Kindred members will be able to enter their Soule lineages in a central location and share this information directly with other members. As far as we know, Soule Kindred is the only Mayflower family association to provide an online database which not only allows members to enter their lineages, but also allows them to collaborate in real time as they do so.

Why did we build the SKFTD?

There were several reasons for building our own site.

The first was **accuracy**. We have always known our Soule lineage, right? Well, not necessarily. While some members have well-documented lineages, others are still looking for that illusive connection to the original George Soule. In addition, thanks to recent updates from the Mayflower Society, other members have recently discovered new and different lineages than they previously thought to be the case. Wherever possible, this database uses the most recent information. As additional Mayflower Society publications became available, the database will be updated accordingly.

Another problem has been the proliferation of information on the internet that is not always accurate. Who among us hasn't tried to chase down some ancestor and, just when we thought we had struck gold, run into some logic problem that cast doubt on the accuracy of the source? Inaccurate information travels at the same nanosecond-speed as accurate information. We are striving to avoid misinformation by asking for source documentation as much as possible.

To build the most robust online site for Soule genealogy on the internet. While some people have spent many hours gathering Soule lineages, we felt that with our breadth of membership, we could surpass anything that one individual could create. We want to become recognized as the best online site on the internet. It is our **joint effort** that will be our ultimate strength.


Increasing membership. Only members will be able to enter their lines and view all of the existing lineages, but non-members will be able to access an index of all names in the database. Hopefully, non-members who share a surname or recognize a shared ancestor's name will join Soule Kindred in America, enter their own lineages, and enjoy the other benefits of membership. You can view the surname page and a sample list of George Soule descendants on page 4.

Helping members find and better understand their lineages. While the Family Tree Committee strives to assist members with completing their lineages, it can only do so much. As the database grows, the possibility of finding that missing link also grows.

Having fun! It's fun to learn, and it's fun to be a part of something larger than one's self. We enjoy seeing and sharing our own research efforts in a public repository. So will you. We enjoy learning that some of our early non-Soule ancestors connect with other members though non-related lines. So will you. We enjoy fixing our mistakes. So will you. We enjoy learning about better source documentation. So will you. We enjoy genealogy and like the fact that we descend from George Soule. We know you do, too!

How is the SKFTD site set up?

We begin with one **Family Tree** which is called George Soule. There are no other trees. In that tree we have pre-entered the first four generations of Soule descendants on your behalf. We used the *George Soule of the Mayflower and his Descendants for Four Generations, Sixth Edition* as our source. It was published in 2011. These first four generations are not a part of any subsequent **Branch**. While some of the 5th and 6th Generation "Pink" books have been published, we have not entered those descendants.

It is the members' task, (with our assistance) to begin their lineages with their 5th generation ancestor. Once you indicate your desire to enter data, we will provide you with access rights to enter your lineage from your 5th generation ancestor. Each 5th generation ancestor becomes his or her own **Branch**. For an example of a Branch, see Karen's ancestor chart from her 10th generation ancestor, the last one with the Soule surname, back to her 5th generation ancestor on page 6.

Some of you will share that access with other members who descend from the same 5th generation ancestor or **Branch**. You will also want to connect your 5th generation ancestor to your 4th generation ancestor and thus, to the original George Soule of the Mayflower. Even after you are entering data on your own, we will be available to give assistance. If we cannot solve your problem at the user level, we have access to technical assistance as well.

What features does the SKFTD provide?

Privacy


The database allows you to hide the names of all living people by checking the "Living" box. Only the member with Editor Rights and the Administrator will be able to see living people. **A word of caution!** Since some members will share the same 5th generation ancestor, they will also be able to see all living people within that same lineage. If you don't want any other member to ever see your living relatives, then do not enter them. Non-members will never be able to see living relatives, nor change any of your entries.


People Feature

The database automatically assigns an individual number to every individual you enter. You only need then to follow the screens to enter birthdates and places, gender, etc. Your person will automatically be assigned to your particular Branch and of course the George Soule Tree. *An example of all the information associated with an individual, in this case, Karen's 7th generation ancestor, John W. Soule, can be viewed on page 7.*

Family Feature


Whenever you add a spouse or relationship, the database automatically assigns a unique family number for each spouse created. The list of family surnames always begins with the male spouse, and assumes that the children will carry the male spouse's surname. When that is not the case, the children's surname may be changed, but the father's surname will remain the same. See page 8 to view the editing page for one of the families of Karen's 7th generation ancestor John W. Soule.


Sources

You may enter source information for any individual. The database will automatically assign a source number for each source you enter. The database also gathers together all source entries so they can be easily reviewed. You can see all of the individuals linked to a particular source number. You may wish to review the collection for your earlier generations to avoid duplicate entries of the same source.



Notes

You may add individual notes for any individual or family. These notes are also gathered together and may be reviewed.



Tutorials

We have created three tutorials to help with your understanding. We will build more as needed.

Media

You may upload photos and documents to an individual or family.

Other Features

The database allows for the gathering and presenting of cemetery entries, place names, birthdates and anniversaries, statistics, albums, and much more.

So, how do you take part in this new venture?

Well, as a member of Soule Kindred, you can access the SKFTD by first going to the Soule Kindred website (www.soulekindred.org) and logging in using your e-mail address and password. Once you are logged in, click on **SKFTD** in the red menu bar. Then click on **SKFTD** again.

For privacy and security puposes, you will initially be asked to create a username, password, and profile (name, address, and phone number) specific to the SKFTD. All new profiles will be approved by Soule Kindred as either having editing rights, for members who wish to add lineages to the database, or viewing rights for those who just want to explore the database.* Only duespaying members of Soule Kindred will be granted approval. Guest Members and the public will only have access to an index of all the names in the database as shown on page 4. The approval process may take a few days, but you will receive an e-mail when your profile has been approved.

Once your profile has been approved, you'll be able to access the SKFTD using the same process described above. Log into the Soule Kindred website, click on **SKFTD** in the red menu bar, click on **SKFTD** again, and then enter your SKFTD username and password.

One way to start your exploration of the database is by clicking on **Soule Kindred Family Tree Database (SKFTD)** in the red menu bar (circle A on page 11). You'll be taken to Pilgrim George


Soule and can work your way down through his descendants. Another way to begin is to search

for a particular name, either using the search function or clicking on **Surnames** (circle B on page


11) to view the list as shown on page 4. Or you may want to click on **Places** (circle C on page 11)

to see a list of the states where Soule descendants were born, lived, married, died, and/or were

buried (shown below) and begin your exploration of the database from there.



^{*}Those members who wish to be "editors" and add their lineages to the database should indicate that interest in the Notes box when they initially complete their profiles. They will be contacted by Keith, who is the SKFTD administrator, and given instructions on how to enter their lineage.



We hope you find the SKFTD to be a valuable addition to the benefits of your membership in Soule Kindred. This database project has been several years in the making and involved many individuals - Dave Hargreave who had a vision to collaboratively update/correct Rev. Ridlon's 1926 book; Board members who voted to approve the project; the technical assistance of web gurus Jeff Carroll and Bryan Larson who installed and tweaked the program to fit Soule Kindred's needs; and members such as Carolyn Cunkle, Andy Turner, John Sims, & David Gregory, to name a few, who beta-tested the site by entering their lineages.

2013 Soule Kindred Annual Report

Article IX, Section B of the Bylaws requires the President to issue to the membership an annual report with a summary of accomplishments and business conducted during the previous year. The 2013 Financial Report Summaries can be found on page 14.

In 2013 Soule Kindred in America continued to grow, evolve and develop. We began to develop a 3-year strategic plan, saw membership remain steady, and worked to expand outreach and benefits to our members. We remain dedicated to our mission as we adapt to the changing world of communication in the 21st century.

Soule Kindred membership stood at 351 members at the end of 2013, a slight increase from 2012. We continue to build our online presence through Facebook, email, and the website, while utilizing postal mail to ensure we reach every member.

Our finances continued to be stable and even slightly improved. A very successful fundraising appeal netted SKA over \$3,000 for scholarships, general operations and research.

With the funding of the Social Media grant from the Merle and Luther Soules Family Foundation, we continue to increase our visibility through our website, Facebook presence and Twitter activities. Although the website suffered a few technical glitches this year, traffic to the website and through our social media outlets continued to grow. All SKA Newsletters are available digitally to the general public through the website. The site also provides relevant information for the public and potential members, including an online membership application and payment process.

Soule Family Tree Project Committee, chaired by Keith Kingman, expanded its mission in 2013 and launched a brand new project that has tremendous potential benefit for SKA members. Using The Next Generation of Genealogy Sitebuilding (TNG) software, which has been adapted specifically to meet the needs of Soule Kindred, members can chart their own genealogical history online and connect it to others across the Soule Family Tree and, of course, to George Soule. The Family Tree Committee also continued to advise and support Soule Kindred members in tracing their lineage to George Soule and also helped members wishing to join other lineage societies such as Mayflower Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, Sons of the American Revolution, United Daughters of the Confederacy and similar organizations. We encourage all members to contact Keith (kkingman@aol.com) to get an orientation for using the Soule Kindred Family Tree Database.

Soule Kindred did not receive any applications for scholarships in 2013 and therefore did not award a scholarship. Because of that, the Scholarship Committee decided to slightly revise the application to make the required essay less complicated and less extensive. We are optimistic that we will receive applications in 2014 and be able to again award Soule Kindred scholarships.

One of the highlight events of 2013 was the Soule Kindred reunion held in Meridian, MS, longtime home of an extensive family of descendants of George Soule. Bob and Helen Soulé hosted the meeting, which included visits to the Soulé Live Steam Festival held at the Mississippi Industrial Heritage Museum (formerly Soulé Steam Feed Works, established in 1898); the 1890's Grand Opera House; the antebellum home, Merrehope; the 1904 Denzel Carrousel; and the Jimmy Rogers (the father of country music) museum. Attendees enjoyed getting to know their cousins as they explored the Soules in the South. Soule Family Tree Chairman, Keith Kingman, treated attendees to a demonstration workshop on the Soule Kindred Family Tree Database.

Another highlight of the year relates to the research commissioned by Soule Kindred to research the origins of Mary Beckett, George Soule's wife. Caleb Johnson produced an outstanding report, published in our newsletter and the Mayflower Quarterly, containing new information about Mary that appears to clarify her identity and shed new light on her origins. Soule Kindred has allocated additional funds for 2014 to commission more research in this important area.

The Soule Kindred in America annual meeting was held again via conference call. Any SKA member was able to join the call, listen to the Board members give their reports, and ask questions. A recording of the meeting was also available afterwards through the website for those who could not participate live. While it is always preferable to have face-to-face meetings, using this method for the annual meeting gives more members a chance to participate and provide input for the future direction of SKA. The next face-to-face reunion is scheduled to be in Fort Wayne, IN, in 2015.

For Soule Kindred, 2013 was a successful year and 2014 will continue our progress. Looking ahead, priorities include finalizing, approving and implementing the SKA strategic plan; continuing implementation of the Soule Kindred Family Tree Database; and planning for reunions in 2015 in Fort Wayne, Plymouth in 2017 and the Mayflower 400 year anniversary in 2020.
