



Soule Kindred Scholarship

The Board of Directors will again offer a scholarship to students who are about to enter their first or second year at an accredited institution of higher learning. The scholarship for 2018 will be in the amount of \$1,150 and the award will be based upon the answers to the questions in the application. Particular attention will be given to the statement of lineage from George Soule (question #2) and the one-page statement addressing question #8 of the application.

All applications with supporting material must be received by the Scholarship Committee by July 1, 2018. The announcement will be made by August 15, 2018, and the actual monetary award will be made after the Scholarship Committee has received the academic transcript of the winner's successful completion of his/her first semester.

If no application is considered sufficiently meritorious to justify awarding the scholarship, then none will be awarded. The Scholarship Application is located on page 10.

This is the first of our new regular feature item, Soules in Service. Conceptualized by SKA member, John Sims, this tribute will honor family members who have served in our country's armed forces.




We proudly salute Norman Soulé [George, Nathaniel, Nathaniel, Wesson, James, Gardner, William, James, Norman, for his service to our country!

Norman, who was SKA's Keeper of the Banners for years, is remembered by his daughter, SKA member, Rosemary (Soulé) Peters, for his service in the Navy. During WWII Norman was a gunner in the Navy Armed Guard aboard an army transport ship in the Pacific with the primary purpose of taking soldiers into combat areas and bringing out the wounded. When in a combat-area port during an air raid, the ship would be covered with a smokescreen and the sailors were not allowed to fire so as not to attract attention.

Norman's family continued this demonstration of service to our country: His oldest son, William, was in Navy Aviation, and William's son, Jeffrey, was in the Army.

SKA Mayflower Tour to Europe Continued

To pique your interest, here is a brief overview of the planned itinerary:

Day 1: Depart North America

Day 2: Amsterdam, Leiden

We will meet our local Dutch guide and start our tour with a group lunch.

Day 3: Leiden, Delfshaven, Harwich

We will visit the Pilgrim Fathers' Church and explore the harbor district.

Day 4: Harwich, Boston, Lincoln

Harwich is the port town where Captain Christopher Jones was born.

Day 5: Worksop, Scrooby, Babworth, Gainsborough, Lincoln

We will take a tour of local sites that would have been very familiar to the Pilgrim Fathers.

Day 6: Droitwich Spa, Worcester

We will travel to Droitwich Spa, the birthplace of Edward Winslow.

Day 7: Plymouth

We will tour the city on a special walk, called "One Small Candle".

Day 8: Plymouth, Dartmouth, Southampton

We will travel to nearby Dartmouth, which is where the Mayflower and the Speedwell docked for repairs.

Day 9: Southampton

An expert guide will take us on a walk while describing Southampton as it would have been in 1620.

Day 10: London

We will drive to London and have lunch in the Mayflower Pub in Rotherhithe.

Day 11: London

We will explore the South Bank area of London.

Day 12: Departure day

The tour will cost between \$2,899 and \$3,399 without respective round trip airfares to Amsterdam with a \$350 deposit required at time of reservation. Contact John Sims for more information jsims99@comcast.net.

Soule Kindred in America, a non-profit member organization, was founded in 1967 by two descendants of Pilgrim George Soule: Col. John Edward Soule and George Standish Soule. Membership is open to anyone although most are descendants of George Soule. Soule Kindred programs and activities include:

- Soule Kindred Newsletter that documents the history and milestones of the Soule family in America. It is published three times per year.
- Family Tree Database and assistance for members seeking to identify their ancestors and document their genealogy.
- Reunions, hosted in different locales, where cousins can meet, mingle and learn about their shared history.
- Research on Soule family genealogy, including DNA testing, in the U.S. and Europe.
- College scholarships awarded to Soule descendants.
- Communication through traditional and non-traditional outlets, including the newsletter, our website soulekindred.org, Facebook and other social media outlets.

Mission Statement



Soule Kindred Remembers: Charles Samuel Dickenson



Charles Samuel "Sam" Dickenson [George, John, Moses, Gideon, Gideon, Rufus, Alcey Ann (Soule) Graves, Lauretta (Graves) Moyers, Lillian Camille (Moyers) Dickenson, William Raymond], long-time resident of Nesbit, Mississippi, passed away at the age of 82 on December 17, 2017. His beloved wife of 60 years, Doris Ann (Davis) Dickenson, was at his side.

Charles was born on December 5, 1935, in Estelline, Texas, to parents Willie Mae Gattis Dickenson and William Raymond Dickenson. He spent his childhood years in Houston, Texas, and attended Milby High School. On his 18th birthday he joined the United States Marine Corps, serving tours in Korea and Japan. On October 7, 1957, Charles and Doris were married in Houston. Following his career in the Marines, Charles continued to serve his country in Southeast Asia

as an employee of Air America. He led his wife and three children on a worldwide adventure including residencies in Taiwan, Thailand, and later Mauritania, West Africa. When the family returned to the United States in 1973, they settled in southern Arizona, which appealed to Charles and his love for the old west, cowboy life and desert mountain landscapes. In 1984 Charles joined FedEx and he and Doris relocated to Nesbit, Mississippi. Upon his retirement from FedEx in 2001, they continued to travel throughout Europe and Asia. Charles was an active member of the Nesbit Church of Christ, where he maintained the baptistry and performed other acts of support to the congregation.

Charles is survived by his wife, Doris, and their three children and their spouses: Carol Dickenson Hunter and Ron Zastrow of Anchorage, AK; Raymond and Linda Dickenson of Jupiter, FL; Lillian Dickenson Gibson and Mark Gibson of Kamloops, BC; his brother, John Dickenson, and wife, Theresa, of Spring, Texas; and sister, Nan Dickenson, and husband, David Ackley, of Lake Jackson, Texas. He also leaves five cherished grandchildren: John McDermott, Christopher Boor, Nancy and William Ryan Dickenson, Nelson Davis Hunter and his great grandson and namesake, Samuel Cash Boor.

Announcing SKA's 2017 Scholarship Winners: Benjamin Whitby and Hannah E. Smith

Soule Kindred is pleased to announce two outstanding recipients of the 2017 SKA Scholarship! **Benjamin Whitby,** of Wescosville, PA, attends Millersville University studying Technology and Engineering Education. His future goals include graduating from Millersville in 2020, obtaining a teaching position at a high school in the Lehigh Valley, PA, and leading a Young Life program at that school. Benjamin acknowledges how he and George Soule have something in common:

"While George went boldly to the New World in the 1600s, I am going boldly into two new areas in the 2000s. Primarily, I am a pioneer in the world of education. As a Technology and Engineering Education major at Millersville University, I am going boldly into an emerging field. "Tech ed" teachers are currently high in demand across the country as schools are beginning to focus on hands-on learning. In three short years, I hope to be creating a curriculum involving architecture, engineering, and teamwork, and teaching it to high school students."

Ben was described by his Young Life teacher as someone who "is never too shy to ask questions and wants to learn as much as he can. This is one of the most valuable

qualities we look for in leaders because this will serve them well for the rest of their lives. It keeps them open-minded to other people's opinions, and also helps them to continue being a student in all situations."

His freshman year, Ben earned all As and a place on the Dean's List. He volunteers outside of practices and services for his Worship Team band with stage set up and organizing events. He steps forward and leads the team in time of struggle. His Worship Team Leader says, "His compassion toward others is very evident in all areas." Best of luck, Ben!

Our other scholarship recipient is **Hannah E. Smith.** This is the second year in a row that Hannah has demonstrated the skills, achievements, and attitude to garner our support with the SKA Scholarship. A Computer Science major at Southern Virginia University in Buena Vista, VA, Hannah is planning to pursue a career in programming and/or website management. Her college advisor describes her as a "bright, enthusiastic and energetic student, who consistently contributes greatly to the success of my classes." He continues, "Hannah is an acknowledged leader among her peers, and has volunteered her time to help classmates and other first-year students complete difficult assignments."



Hannah's essay response to the following question was quite remarkable:

The 400th anniversary of the Pilgrims' voyage and arrival is in 2020. If you were responsible for planning the events to commemorate this event, what are the most important things that you would want to emphasize to educate the public about the Pilgrims and their importance four centuries later.

Hannah responded, "I would focus on the characteristics and virtues that set them apart as early colonists. I would show how it was the Plymouth Colony's moral principles that ensured that they would be remembered and celebrated more than other early settlements." She went on to explain how "Like many others who would follow them, they came to America for freedom of conscience." Hannah did an excellent job of comparing the Pilgrims to the settlers of Jamestown. She wrote, "Unlike the Jamestown Colony, which managed to provoke Native Americans by showing disrespect and exhibiting a sense of entitlement and superiority, the Pilgrim settlers tended to approach the Native Americans they met with more humility and respect." She pointed out that while the Jamestown Colony had to be held together by a militaristic regime, the Pilgrims joined together under the Mayflower Compact to mutually agree on how they would govern themselves.

Hannah's essay exemplifies her strong academic reasoning and communication skills, which contributed to her earning straight As throughout her freshman year. Congratulations Hannah! We wish you much future success!

In 2020, we will celebrate the Pilgrim's landing and establishment of Plymouth Colony in 1620. This 400th anniversary will be a milestone; an historic tribute to honor those who laid the foundation for the independence and freedom we cherish to this day in America.

The Pilgrims who signed this document united together into a civil body politic...to enact, constitute, and frame, such just and equal laws, ordinances, acts, constitutions, and offices, from time to time, as shall be thought most meet and convenient for the general good of the colony; unto which we promise all due submission and obedience.

It is extremely important that future generations be by the Pilgrims and be familiar to Lineage Assistance with the tenets of the Mayflower Compact — America's "first Constitution". As a descendant of George Soule, or other Mayflower passengers, you can be instrumental in marking this 400th anniversary by establishing a Memorial at your local schoolyard (see photos on back cover).


