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## John P. Soule, a Prolific and Cutting-Edge Photographer of the 19<sup>th</sup> Century

A descendant of *Mayflower* passenger, George Soule, John Payson Soule was a photographer and publisher based mainly in Boston, Massachusetts, and Seattle, Washington. His lineage is as follows: George Soule, John, Moses, Barnabas, John, Benjamin, John, John P.

John P. Soule was born in Phillips, Maine, on October 16, 1828. He was the first son born to John and Mary True Soule. In the 1830s, the family moved to Turner, Maine. His younger brother, William Stinson (1836-1908) would eventually follow in his footsteps and also become a photographer. We previously published articles on Will Soule

written by Marcy Kelly (see the Fall 2009, Vol. XXXXIII, No. 4 and Fall 2018, Vol LII, No. 3 issues of *Soule Kindred Newsletter*).

John married Harriet Campbell on February 22, 1848, and they had three children: Lucie, Hattie and Franklin. After living in Georgetown, Maine, and in Boston, the family settled in Malden, Massachusetts. From 1846-1856, John pursued business opportunities in Portland, ME, New York and Boston. He collaborated with machinist and draftsman John Rogers and opened Rogers & Soule, Printsellers in Boston in late 1857.


## John P. Soule continued

The next year, John began studying photography and by 1859 was an apprentice to New England photographic pioneer, Jessie Wallace (JW) Black. He was then hired by the Bierstadt Brothers (Albert, Charles and Edward). In 1860 Soule joined the Bierstadt Brothers on a photographic expedition to the White Mountains of New Hampshire. He was responsible for selecting vantage points for landscape photographs.

Upon returning to Boston, John set out on his own, founding his business, which he called simply John P. Soule. At the end of the Civil War, he documented the combat destruction at locations such as Fort Sumter and Fort Moultrie. Next, he began reproducing famous art works, including Michelangelo's paintings in the Sistine Chapel and figurines of ancient Egypt, Greece and Rome.

He operated The John P. Soule Company on Washington Street in Boston from 1861-1882. As a photographer, his subjects in Boston included buildings, the 1869 National Peace Jubilee, the great fire of 1872, and carte-de-visite (calling card) portraits. He also photographed the 1866 fire in Portland, Maine.



The carte-de-visite trend helped spread political attitudes of the time with photographs and art printed on cardboard cards that could be distributed widely. The carte-de-visite shown at right, entitled "Emancipation", personifies the nation as a white woman who wraps a large American flag around two slaves. J.P. Soule is credited as photographer and a John Sowle is credited as publisher.

# John P. Soule continued

John P. Soule joined the Ancient and Honorable Artillery Company of Massachusetts in 1865 and belonged to the Freemasons. He exhibited works in the Charitable Mechanic's exhibitions of 1850 and 1874, where he received a bronze medal.


He added to his success when he began publishing stereographic views in 1875. Stereographs were a very popular form of photography in the 19th century. Using a special camera, photographers would take two nearly identical images which, when printed side by side, would appear as a three-dimensional image when viewed through a set of special lenses called a stereoscope.

John also photographed whimsical art pieces such as "Frogs on Promenade" and "A Male and Female Frog Courting, Watched by a Frog Voyeur".

In 1882 John passed the business on to his brother William, and a partner, William Everett. The new team changed the company's name to the Soule Photographic Company. The Soule Photographic Co. specialized in photographing the exteriors and interiors of buildings, mainly in Boston and its surrounding suburbs and summer communities including the works of major architects, such as Peabody and Stearns, Arthur Little and Henry Hobson Richardson.

On December 7, 1884, John's wife, Harriet, passed away. He left Boston and traveled west, photographing in Colorado and Utah along the Denver & Rio Grande Railroad and in Salt Lake City. In 1888, John Soule moved to Seattle, where he continued to work as a photographer. He photographed the aftermath of the Seattle Fire of 1889 (see photo below) and rebuilding.

John P. Soule continued to live in Seattle and occasionally take photographs of the growing city until his death in 1904.

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## Soule Kindred Remembers Virginia Hayes

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Virginia (Ginny) Lehman Hayes, 87, passed away on November 6, 2021, at her home in Kendallville, IN. [George, Susannah (Soule) West, Susannah (West) Barber, Joseph, Susanna (Barber) Rathbun, Jonathon, Chaplin, Jeannette (Rathbun) Cleveland, Clark Rathbun, Irvin Lesle, Helen Alma (Cleveland) Lehman].

Virginia was born on October 9, 1934, in Ashtabula, Ohio to Menno I. and Helen (Cleveland) Lehman. She married Joseph B. Hayes on November 30, 1957, in Berne, Indiana.

A graduate of Berne-French Township High School in Berne, Indiana, and Baldwin Wallace College in Berea, Ohio, she taught home economics in Rochester, NY, and Portland, IN. She trained as a swim instructor as a staff member at Chester YWCA in Chester, PA. After the family relocated to Kendallville, IN, she continued swim instruction at Bixler Lake. When the Cole Center YMCA of Kendallville opened, she served as the Aquatic Director and the Executive Director. Her most loved job was teaching swimming to community members aged 6 months to 88 years.

Mrs. Hayes was also the Assistant General Manager of the Potawatomi Inn at Pokagon State Park. As the Special Events Coordinator for the Indiana State Park Inns, she ran the Elderhostel/Rhodes Scholar, and the Road Rally programs.

A member of The Indiana Descendants of the Mayflower, Virginia served on the Executive Committee as Board Secretary. She was a member of the Pokagon Chapter of DAR, the Indiana Descendants of the Mayflower Society, Soule Kindred in America, Quest Club and Trinity Church United Methodist.

Virginia enjoyed traveling and planning reunions for her high school classmates, Elderhostel and family. She also wrote histories for her family members, including her husband, her Descendants of the Mayflower mother, and Swiss ancestry father, grandfather and great grandfather in Berne, IN.

She is survived by two daughters, Susan (Christopher) Courter of Fairfield, OH, and Judith (Craig) Huss of Rancho Palos Verdes, CA; four grandchildren, Jeremy (Tasha) Courter, Joshua (Dora) Courter, Keila Huss and Henry Huss; and four great-grandchildren, Ben Courter, Jack Courter, Juno Courter and Mace Menno Courter. She is also survived by a niece and two nephews and their families.

She was preceded in death by her parents, her husband, Joseph in 2015, a son, Robert in 1987 and a sister, Barbara Lehman Henderson in 2012.


# Soule Kindred Remembers Virginia Hayes continued

Virginia was a big supporter of Soule Kindred in America after becoming a member in 2006. She helped create a memorable experience for many as Chair and host of the 2015 SKA Reunion, Oct. 22-24, 2015, in Fort Wayne, Indiana. For those of you that were lucky enough to attend, you probably recall highlights such as the turn-of-the-20th century Beaux Arts-style Allen County Courthouse, the 1930 Art Deco Lincoln Bank Tower, and the Embassy Theatre, built in 1928 and current home of the Fort Wayne Philharmonic Orchestra. The Banquet Dinner, always a focal point of our reunions, included an artifact "Show and Tell" where cousins brought in Soule treasures to share with the group. These included an original land grant, a mysterious "George Soule" pewter plate, and most unusual of all, a tool (hand-made and owned by George Wilberforce Soulé, *Soule Kindred Newsletter*, Vol. 44, No. 2) for whittling down and smoothing an irritating prosthetic leg.

In her article about the 2015 SKA Reunion in the Fall 2015 issue, Vol. XXXIX, No.3 of *Soule Kindred Newsletter*, Karen McNally wrote the following:

*A big thank you goes to the 2015 reunion committee. ## Did you know...

The most reliable and comprehensive source of information about the Pilgrims has been a 270-page handwritten manuscript written by William Bradford, detailing the activities of the Separatists/Pilgrims that was first published in 1669. The most popular version of Bradford's *Of Plimoth Plantation* was prepared by historian Samuel Eliot Morison in 1952.

Between 1620 and 1630 there were several ships in England with the name *Mayflower*. In 1628, two ships bearing the name *Mayflower* arrived in Salem and Plymouth. However, it has been determined with some certainty that neither of those ships were the *Mayflower* of 1620.

Judith was born April 13, 1941, in Cincinnati, Ohio, to the late William Coolidge and Dorothea Forthman Coolidge.

She lived most of her adult life in the south, including the beautiful mountains of western North Carolina. She graduated from a three-year nursing education program in Augusta, Georgia, earned a Bachelor of Science degree in Nursing

from the Medical College of Georgia, a Master of Science in Family Health Nursing from Clemson University, and a Doctorate in Education in Adult and Community College Education from North Carolina State University.

Judy Hughes was a Registered Nurse, a nurse educator, mother, grandmother, and great-grandmother. She was an active member of Soule Kindred in America, serving on the Board of Directors as Treasurer. Judy created the Soule Kindred in America Membership Directory, served on the *Soule Kindred Newsletter* Committee and Chaired the Lineage Assistance Committee.

Judy enjoyed traveling, family history and genealogy. She also loved assisting others. She was an active Disaster Services Human Resource for the American Red Cross, the Captain of the Disaster Action Team in her community and taught Emergency Preparedness and other American Red Cross classes.

Judith was a member of several societies: United Daughters of the Confederacy, Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR), the Mayflower Society, and Soule Kindred in America. She was a Nursing Educator at Southwestern Community College until retirement. She was of the Methodist faith and a member of Hickory Knoll Methodist Church. She enjoyed the fellowship in her church and other community groups including the Senior Games.

Judith is survived by her son, Robert Hughes (Vivian) of Franklin; her daughter, Tara Doster (Joe) of Franklin; grandchildren, Tyler Hughes, Tucker Hughes, Debbie Hunter, Tommy Ammons, Cassie Doster and Carrie Whitton; and great grandchildren, Emily Hunter, Cayden Hunter, and Payton Seymour. In addition to her parents, Judith was preceded in death by her husband, Robert Hughes.

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# Christmas and New Year's Eve in Colonial America

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## Pilgrims Didn't Do Christmas

It might be hard to imagine the Christmas season without Santa, hanging stockings and giving gifts, but most of these traditions didn't get started until the 19th century.

The Separatists who came over on the *Mayflower* were looking for a "purer" form of Christianity. They wanted to strip it of Roman Catholic traditions they saw as excessive, including Christmas.

Christmas had roots in the pagan Roman winter festival of Saturnalia, as well as the Norse festival of Yule. In the 17th century, celebrations of Christmas in England lasted for nearly two weeks—from the day recognized as the birth of Jesus, December 25, to Twelfth Day, January 6. During this time, people engaged in much merriment: drinking, feasting, gambling and going to masquerade balls. The Pilgrims in Plymouth would have none of that!

They treated their first Christmas in the New World as just one more working day. Governor William Bradford noted in his diary that they began building the colony's first house on December 25, 1620.

The following year, when a group of newly arrived settlers refused to work on Christmas Day, Bradford acquiesced until they could become "better informed." But he drew a firm line after he found them playing games while everyone else worked.

"If they made the keeping of it [Christmas] a matter of devotion, let them keep their houses," Bradford wrote. "But there should be no gaming or reveling in the streets."

## New Year's Eve Was on March 24

In 1621 the New Year did not start on January 1. It wasn't because Gov. Bradford feared the Puritans would have too much fun on New Year's Eve—but because England refused to go along with the rest of Europe in adopting the Gregorian calendar.

The English year didn't change until March 25, or Lady Day, when Christians would celebrate the Feast of the Annunciation of the Blessed Virgin. So, in 1620, John Winthrop's father, Adam, wrote in his diary, "The new year beginneth," on March 25.

England and her colonies finally accepted the new calendar when Parliament passed the Calendar Act of 1750. As of 1752, January 1 was officially the New Year and 11 days were dropped from September. We should all be a bit grateful this got sorted out. In an attempt to avoid confusion, for years there was "double dating".

Historians generally listed both Old Style and New Style dates for pre-1752 records. Look up Ethan Allen, for example, and you'll see his dates listed as "January 21, 1738 [O.S. January 10, 1737] – February 12, 1789." But that isn't always the case. George Washington changed his birthdate from Feb. 11, 1732, under the Julian calendar to Feb. 22, 1732, under the Gregorian calendar.


