Lt. Colonel Turner is a veteran of, three wars. He served in the Quartermaster Corps for 20 years, coming home in 1951 from service in Japan and Korea to become an instructor of reserve army units at Fort Hayes in Columbus.

A natice of Franklin County, Ohio, Lt. Colonel Turner traces his ancestry back to George Soule who was on the Mayflower and to Zephaniah Rogers who served in the Revolutionary War. His first ancestor into Ohio was Mrs. Susanna Rogers Turner, a widow, who came from Bedford County, Pa., to settle at the first farm back from the Sciolo River below Dublin.

He has been a member of the RCGS for five years

Although he has been interested in history most of his life, the new president became interested in genealogy because of his wife's interest. Gwendolyn Turner's family came to Johnsville in Morrow County with the Shauck family in 1807. Francis Coke is her Mayflower ancestor and Alexander Lemmon is her Revolutionary War ancestor.

Lt. Colonel Turner is a member of 20 clubs and organizations, including the Ohio State University Alumni Club. During his senior year there, he was business manager of The Lantern. He was graduated in 1926 with a backelor of science degree in journalism. He worked for nine years as an advertising man between World War I and World War II.

ONE MAN'S MEAT

History and genealogy buffs will be interested in a project of Lt. Col. and Mrs. Roger Turner, Rt. 2, Perrysville.

The Turners have compiled many old newspapers from throughout this area. The papers will then be microfilmed by the Ohio Historical Society in Columbus for use by historians and genealogist not only in Ohio but across the nation.

For several years I wondered what became of the old file copies that I knew had existed. Former Publisher G.L. Cherp, I was told, sold or gave them to historian D.W. Garber. From there the papers were at the end of a cold trail. The Turners told me they have them and have spent countless hours indexing, sorting, and preparing them for the microfilming process.

Knox, Richland, and Ashland County papers are in their collection and these include the old Bellville Star, the Bellville Messenger and Independent, The Butler Times and the Tri-Forks Press.

I hope to have a copy of the microfilm on file here, and there will be a copy at the Ohio Geneological Society.

Although many hundreds of editions of various papers are involved, the copies are not complete and the Turners would be interested in adding to the microfilm collection to get it as complete as possible. If you have old papers and would be willing to share them for this project, call the Star-Press office and tell us the dates and volume numbers so they can be checked against existing copies.

For several years we have been trying to get the file copies here at the Star-Press in order checking for missing copies and illegible ones. It is an off and on project, compounded by a lack of consistency in the numbering-dating on the papers caused by printers' errors.

It is hard to imagine the task which faced the Turners with their old papers.

Old newspapers have little or no cash value but they do have value for historical research.

If you have a few, or many, please call The Star-Press office and give us the volume, number, and date. The Turners have asked that we serve as a clearing house for any additions to make the microfilming process as complete as possible.

Portfolio Ever More Climbers In the Family Trees

For Betty Johnson McDaniel, it all began when her Texas grandmother told her over and over again to "act like a lady, Betty, you're a direct descendant of Robert E. Lee."

Now 34, a Suitland housewife and mother of three, Mrs. McDaniel has found by delving into her family past that she is not at all a descendant of Robert E. Lee, (nor of George Washington, which her grandmother also alleged) but of Ninian Beall, who once owned Georgetown, and another ancestor who owned land where the White House now stands.

what most excites the Texas rancher's daughter (who has lived in all parts of the country with her Army officer husband), is that her earliest American ancestors are not from Texas at all, but from Prince Georges County, where she has lived for the past two years.

"Isn't it exciting?" she whispered from behind a stack of books and papers at the Library of Congress, one of Washington's four major meccas for ancestor hunters. "This has made dates and place names come alive for me!"

She had parked her children at the Smithsonian for the day, while the day before, she had sent them off to tour the Maryland State House while she upended the Annapolis Hall of Records.

Mrs. McDaniel is one of a growing number of amateur genealogists, an absorbing avocation that now is America's third most popular indoor pastime after stamp and coin collecting.

ONCE THE EXCLUSIVE bailiwick of the Daughters of the American Revolution, who must establish a certain lineage to join; the Mormons, who can baptize their ancestors into their relatively new religion if their names and connections are known; and the American upper class, genealogy has now become open territory.

Not only are wealthy WASPs doing it to insure the publication of their daughter's wedding in the New York Times; Americans of Polish, Italian, French, German, Indian and African descent are doing it too. Anybody who ever had a parent can play.

Besides being greater in number, amateur genealogists are getting younger, where once almost all were retired people. ("The closer they are to the Grim Reaper, the more interested they are in their roots," one librarian whispered.)



THERE ARE TWO WAYS to trace a family tree. One is to hire a professional genealogist, (their names are listed at genealogical libraries, not in the telephone book) which can cost from \$2 to \$10 an hour, the average price being \$5. This can be expensive, considering the process can go on for 20 years or more.

Another is to do it yourself. Professional genealogists say beginners should first read a simple methodology book, such as Gilbert Doane's "Searching for your Ancestors," now published in paperback by Bantam.

Next, the beginner should ransack the house for family records, including the family Bible. He should contact and question all living relatives about the names and birthplaces and birthdates of their parents and grandparents as far as can be remembered. Next local courthouses, cemeteries, churches, libraries, and historical societies should be consulted.

Finally, the amateur is ready to take on what one genealogist calls "The Four Stations of the Cross": the DAR, the Library of Congress, the National Archives, and the National Genealogical Society.

S.F. Port Has a New Director

Boston port director Thomas Taft Soules was named director of the Port of San Francisco yesterday, but the long-delayed appointment caused new rifts at the city's troubled port.

Soules, 55, has been at Boston's port since 1965 and is well-known among maritime experts.

He was nominated by the Port Commission at a closed meeting on Tuesday night; and the appointment was confirmed without comment yesterday by Mayor J seph Alioto.

The Port Commission vote was 3 to 2, The Chronicle learned, and the dissenting commissioners wrote a blunt "Refused to Sign" before their names on the letter of nomination.

The dissenters were commissioners Gary Vannelli, a lawyer, and Harry Bridges, longshoremen's union president. Both men reportedly were holding out to give the job to Bernard Orsi, who served as temporary port director from August until last week.

Orsi, a close political aide of Alioto, is the city's civil service chief and had no maritime experience before his brief stint at the port.

"I just would have prelerred a younger man than Soules," Vannelli said, "and one who knows the political situation in San Francisco."

The letter nominating Soules called him "a truly outstanding person of great professional abilities" and noted he was ranked second among 97 applicants for the job by a prestigious committee of the Chamber of Commerce. The first choice, Raymond C. Conroy, withdrew from the competition.

"Soules is a thoroughly competent administrator with port experience all over the world," said Judge Byron Arneld, one of the port commissioners who voted for Soules, as did James Rudden and Monsignor Matthew Connelly.

Soules - "It's pronounced

like the soles of your shoes," he said — promised in a telephone interview from Boston that he will be at work at his new job in San Francisco "by the first of the month."

He is expected to pay an introductory visit to the port within a week.

Although he was unsuccessful in efforts to obtain a binding, two-year contract for the job, Soules said the Port Commission assured him he "will be given a fair chance to do the job — that the appointment is professional rather than political."

Soules will serve at the pleasure of the Port Commission. The job carries an annual salary of \$36,000, although Port Commissioners have promised to increase the pay to \$44,000 a year under a reorganization plan.

A native of Seattle, Soules came to the Boston port after an international career as a port administrator, including posts with the Arabian American Oil Co. in Saudi Arabia and the port authority of Guayaquil, Ecuador. His wife, Marlene, is a native of Ecuador.

He is third vice president of the American Association of Port Authorities and a member of the executive committee of the International Association of Ports and Harbors.

Soules was a varsity carsman at the University of Washington and spent a year after college as a seaman on a three-masted sailing vessel.

Waterfront veterans In Boston give Soules much of the credit for a reorganization of the Boston port that improved its competitive standing, although his blunt

manner reportedly alienated some shippers and maritime labor leaders.

Soules said: "When I came to Boston's port we were losing shipping to New York, a lot like San Francisco has lost customers to Oakland."

In recent months, political conflicts have led to some dismissals of top staff at Boston's port. Although Soules was not directly involved, the turmoil there apparently contributed to his decision to come to San Francisco.

Some of the conflict - ofinterest allegations at the port here have concerned the purchase in July of Pacific Far East Line, the port's biggest tenant, by relatives of Mayor Joseph Alipto.

Soules said he met Alioto when he came to San Francisco for an interview.

"The mayor is an impressive man with a big handshake, Soules said. "I don't think he'd want to cause any trouble for me."
